

**New Discovery In Surgery Of Brain Cancers**

ATLANTIC CITY, N. J., Sept. 15—Surgery on brain cancers disclosing existence and location of two personalities in every human brain were reported to the third international cancer congress here today.

The operations, described by Dr. Byron Stookey of the Neurological Institute of New York, removed the prefrontal lobes of four persons, and partly removed those of four others. All are alive today.

The prefrontal lobes, two in number, one on each side of the head, fill the entire forward half of the brain cavity. One of these lobes is usually dominant over the other, a fact held to explain why some persons are left-handed.

**Foreign Service Appointments Are Pending**

OTTAWA, Sept. 15—Formal approval by His Majesty of the Government's selection of a successor to Sir Herbert Markie as Canadian Minister to the United States has not yet been received from London, it was learned today, and no announcement will be made until that approval is received.

Resignation of Sir Herbert, because of his critical illness, was announced in the House of Commons Monday by Prime Minister Mackenzie King, who said at the time: "I am not at liberty at the moment to say when the Government intend to appoint, as it is essential to have His Majesty's approval of the recommendation before any appointment is made."
