THE OFFICIAL REPORTERS.

Mr. PERRY, Mr. YEO, and Mr. BEER expressed regret that official reporters had not, as usual, been appointed. They thought the public should be informed of the proceedings and discussions of the House, and had no desire that what they might say should not be known to their constituents.

Hon. Messrs. SULLIVAN and FERGUSON replied that the Journal kept by the Clerk is the official record of the House, that practically the debates, as officially reported, did not reach the country; that it was not worth while to go to a large expense for the sake of obtaining a Parliamentary Reporter, which could not in the nature of things give entire satisfaction even to the members for whose benefit, almost solely, the expense was incurred.
