Fashion Houses Are Showing Styles Many Seasons Ahead

LONDON (CP) — While British women are trying to keep warm in chilly October weather, London fashion houses are showing filmy beachwear and summer clothes. Constantly working one season ahead, manufacturers are doing their best to woo Britain's women to buy six months in advance. And they're succeeding.

Many of the styles shown in recent collections will go into the stores around Christmas. By the end of April, there won't be too big a choice left.

In the past British women waited until warm weather arrived before buying cottons, but nowadays they're so fashion-conscious the tendency is to purchase around February.

The general trend of three leading fashion houses, Starke, Horrocks and Berklelex Continentals, is for cover-up cotton dresses for town wear in quiet screen prints or dark and pastel shades. All three use bold colors and dashing

designs for play and holiday clothes.

Styles favored are the Empire and Princess lines. Bloused backs and slim skirts also are popular.

One innovation is the high-rise line—a full skirt lifted above the waist at the back. For this design the natural waistline is defined by an inner Petersham band.

Starke of London uses this in a brown-sugar dress patterned with black flowers. It has plain black shoulder straps dipping to a vee at the back which meets the high-rise of the waistline.

This house also introduces gold dusted Indian prints resembling saris. One in mustard flecked with purple is used for a sheath-fitting gown with a stole attached.

Starke emphasizes high necks for summer wear. One sleeveless number comes in dark green tie silk with high-buttoning shirt collar.
