Toronto Argonauts Win Finals Opener From Hamilton

By The Canadian Press Hamilton Tiger-Cats should know exactly how Edmonton Eskimos felt about a month ago before the western football champions pulled the comeback of the year to earn a berth in the Nov. 29 Grey Cup final. The Tiger-Cats, quoted at 6-5 and 7-5 odds to defeat Toronto Argonauts in the first game of their home-and-home total-point Big Four championship series, collapsed before a home-town crowd of 17,312 Saturday and lost 22-6. They have a 18-point deficit to overcome and about now the citizens of the mountain city are probably comparing it to the national debt.

If Tiger-Cats win at Toronto Wednesday afternoon and advance into the Eastern Canada sudden-death final, they will match anything the Eskimos did in the Western semi-finals against Calgary and the final against Winnipeg Blue Bombers. But there aren't many folks around who concede them much of a chance to get past Argonauts.

The Toronto-Hamilton game took top billing in the eastern football week-end but on other fronts two senior championships were won.

Sarnia Imperials won their 16th Senior Ontario Rugby Football Union title and the second in two years with a 24-7 decision over Toronto Balm Beach to make it 65-19 on the total-points round.

The Imps now meet the Big Four titleholder at Toronto next Saturday to decide which team will meet Eskimos in the big one at Varsity Stadium at the end of the month.

The University of Western Ontario Mustangs took the intercollegiate title back to London for the sixth time in eight post-war years by defeating defending champion University of Toronto Blues 8-1. The Mustang victory, breaking a first-place tie with the Blues, finished the college season two points up on the Toronto club.

Millionaires, playing their third game in as many days, were surprisingly fresh at the start. After six minutes of very fast play, they opened the scoring. McDonagh leading McMeekin while Halifax defenceman Carroll Bloom was in the penalty box. He had just returned to the ice when Millionaires scored again on a three-way pass with George Robertson the marksmen.

Graziano's Name Comes Up in N.Y. Narcotics Probe

NEW YORK, Nov. 16—(AP)—Rocky Graziano, former middleweight boxing champion Friday was linked with Thomas (Three-Finger Brown) Luchese, who has been described as the "over-all co-ordinator" of the illicit narcotics traffic in New York City. Graziano's name came into the picture as the State Crime Commission read into the records sworn testimony given by Luchese before commission investigators in private.

Luchese denied he owned a piece of Graziano. The commission, however, produced a wire tap record which allegedly revealed Luchese used to meet with the former champion and fight trainer Whitley Bimstein in the liquor store of Joseph C. Ryan, one of today's witnesses.

The wire tap on Oct. 1, 1946, came after Graziano lost the middleweight title to Tony Zale on Sept. 27. Graziano won the title back again July 16, 1947. Later Rocky was outlawed for a time from boxing in New York State for failing to
