trying to make it more scientific," J. A. Hopps, an electrical engineer with the National Research Council said in an interview Friday at the close of a two-day inaugural conference of the society.

Much of the work done by engineers is in the field of hardware, such as electrical pacers for defective hearts and machines to take over the functions of the heart, lungs and kidney. But in the last five years there has been a growing trend towards production of electronic models simulating various body functions.

The differences between the medical and engineering fields isn't that great, he added.

"For example, blood flow is a matter of hydraulics and hydraulic engineering along with a bit of chemistry."

U.S. Output Of Steel Heads For Sept. High

CLEVELAND (AP) — Steel magazine says a September record for steel production will be set if the current rate is maintained.

The weekly journal of metal-working says average daily production for the first 10 days this month was 366,357 net tons of ingots and castings.

The September record was set in 1964 when output totalled 10,668,978 tons for a daily average of 355,633 tons.

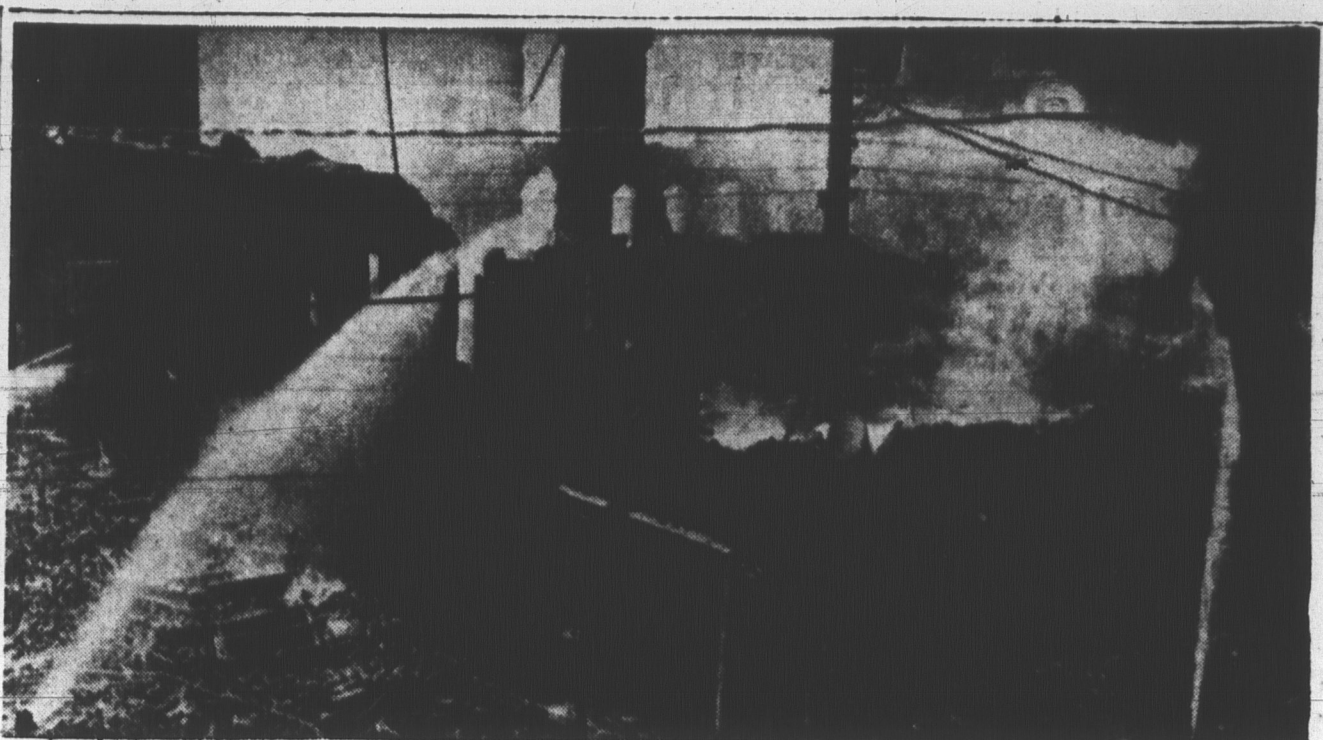
In September of last year production sagged to 9,949,355 tons, for a daily average of 331,645 tons, because steel users began an inventory reduction after the signing of a new labor contract. Steel estimates last week's output at 2,560,000 tons, a drop of 15,000 tons from the previous week as a result of the Labor Day holiday.

The magazine says steel production in August totalled approximately 11,000,000 tons, boosting the total for the first eight months this year to about 90,000,000 tons, down 3.7 per cent from the 93,500,000 tons produced in the corresponding period of 1965.

"Steel consumption by the auto industry will be heavy this month because a September record of 696,000 passenger cars is scheduled for assembly," the magazine says.

ST. HYACINTHE HAS MILLION DOLLAR FIRE

A general alarm fire, heavily damaged half a block of the downtown commercial centre at St. Hyacinthe, Quebec Monday, causing an estimated \$1,000,000 damage. One fireman was injured. Some 50 firemen fought the flames which swept through five business establishments and spread to several others. Reimann's of Montreal — a clothing store — a branch of the Banque Canadienne Nationale, a musical instrument and appliance store and a bowling alley were among the establishments hit.



'Factory Farmer' Declares Small Operator Not Doomed

CANNING, N.S. (CP) — The small farmer is not necessarily doomed, says J. E. (Jock) Peill, self-described "factory farmer" who looks to specialization for success.

Peill, operator of the sprawling 1,650-acre Lyndhurst Farms Ltd. near here, says the future for agriculture never looked better in terms of supply and demand.

"All over the world," he says, "the demand for food seems to be catching-up with the supply."

The small farmer he feels, can capture a sizeable portion of the market through specialization and full use of all available resources.

The 35-year-old native of Germany who emigrated to Canada in 1954 also thinks that many farms in this country are too diversified to take full advantage of modern machinery, "so you are compromising from the beginning."

"This to us is a business, not a way of life," he says. "Like any business, one of management's prime purposes is to use the available resources to their best advantage—this applies to farming just as much as any business."

CLASSIFIED AS BIG

By Maritime province standards, Lyndhurst Farms might be classed as big. It has annual gross of \$250,000 and a payroll of \$40,000. It is operated by a full-time staff of ten. Part time help during harvest adds another 10.

Peill echoes the sentiments of leading agriculturalists across the country when he says agriculture can benefit immensely through mechanization, consolidation of inefficient small farms and the channelling of redundant workers into other industries.

But he champions the small farmer who is more or less self-sufficient and offers examples from his own operation.

One example concerns the little pig who goes to market. In his case it goes to market even more profitably — thanks to a program of growing his own grain.

Peill says he saves \$25 to \$30 a ton by growing instead of purchasing grain. He mills his own crop.

Lyndhurst Farms market about 2,000 feeder pigs a year. Last year's output had a 90 per cent grading in the A bracket.

HOLDINGS GREW FAST

Peill and his father started the Lyndhurst operation as a 100-acre spread in 1901. Subsequent purchases with help from the Nova Scotia Land Settlement Board and bank loans increased the holdings tenfold. Machinery
