

S'ide Firm's Donation Starts Drive In Fish Products Stressed

SUMMERSIDE — Simmons and MacFarlane Ltd. through its president Leslie F. Simmons last evening advised the board of trustees of Prince County Hospital which will start off the hospital fund raising campaign with a donation of \$1,000.

The importance of raising the quality of processed fisheries products was emphasized by Hon. Leo Rossiter, P.E.I. minister of fisheries, in an address to lobster canner foremen attending a three-day canning course in Charlottetown.

Mr. Simmons also stated the employees of his company have agreed to donate their insurance refund cheques to the hospital.

"By a succession of these courses, you are going to be prepared to go back to your canneries and your cutting lines, and improve quality," the minister said.

S'ide Man Sentenced In Break Left Counts

SUMMERSIDE — Dion DeFourier of Summerside was sentenced to three months in magistrate's court yesterday by Magistrate W. C. Bester.

Mr. DeFourier was charged with one year for theft of car accessories, one year for breaking and entering, and one year for theft of a blanket, sentences to be served concurrently. In addition he was also ordered to pay \$20 as his share of costs charged to the Crown.

The charges resulted from an incident last Jan. 14 in the Port Hill area where four men and two companions were involved in the theft of four tires, a battery, a car jack and car jack belonging to Mrs. Agnes Myrtle Campbell of Kingsville. The value of these articles was in excess of \$50.

After changing his original election of trial by judge and jury to trial by magistrate, the four men pleaded guilty to all three counts.
