**Nurses Residence For Montague Discussed**

Tentative plans for the construction of a residence for nurses near the King's County Memorial Hospital were discussed at a special meeting of the hospital board at Montague last evening, which was presided over by the president, Mr. C. N. Rendell.

It was felt by the board that the present quarters for the nurses on the lower floor were inadequate, and some provision should be made as soon as possible to erect a residence. The new home, to be located on hospital grounds, would be designed for living quarters for the nurses, more of whom could then be maintained on the hospital staff, a necessity in view of the fact that the King's County Hospital is a 32-bed hospital serving a large district, and even now is taxed to all its capacity to accommodate the number of patients.

The annual hospital campaign will get under way on Nov. 19th, and it was felt that, if the collection was large, a part of it would be earmarked for the construction of the residence next spring. A campaign committee was appointed including chairman, Mrs. L. H. Poole, secretary treasurer, Mr. Arnold Wightman, and Mrs. G. N. Rendell, who will be responsible for organizing the campaign throughout the district.

**C. P. R. Opposed To New Freight Rates Bill**

OTTAWA, Nov. 6—(CP)—The government's legislation for a new freight-rate setup was challenged on several points by the Canadian Pacific Railway today before the Commons' special committee dealing with the rate "equalization" statute.

F. C. S. Evans, C.P.R. vice-president and general counsel, described the bill's outline of a national policy of rate equalization as "far too sweeping" and called for dropping or the changing of some specific sections.

The C.P.R. officer testified after counsel for the government-owned Canadian National Railways said that company had no objection in principle to the legislation and announced it was offering no argument now.

The presentations were made at the 31-man committee opened hearings on the equalization bill and two lesser statutes brought in by the government as partial implementation of the report of the Royal Commission on Transportation filed last February.

**Hearing May Adjourn**

Indications were the committee would complete hearing of the C.P.R. stand tomorrow and then adjourn until next week to hear other submissions.

Transport Minister Chevrier, who has piloted the bills through second reading in the commons, sat in on the committee sessions and occasionally took issue with vice-president Evans on his criticism of the equalization measure drafted by Mr. Chevrier's experts.

The Canadian Pacific officer, while telling the committee his company favors the principle of rate equalization across the country as far as practicable, said there are "dangers" in the proposed legislation.

Apart from that the "broad, sweeping language" of the equalization measure might impede the rate-regulation board of Transport commissioners to "try the impossible," he listed these individual criticisms of sections of the main bill:

1. Its proposed restrictions on the freedom of the railways to set competitive rates — those put in to meet competitors — would "hamstring" the carriers. He proposed an alternative section to give the Transport Board more leeway than the legislation contemplated.

2. Abolition of the "standard" ceiling — freight rates as proposed by the royal commission and the government was unnecessary and would create a "serious" possibility of opening up the railroads to damage suits from shippers seeking rebates.

3. There was "danger" in the statute's direction to the board that a single uniform scale of class rates — those applying to various classifications of traffic — should be set for the whole country. The board, Mr. Evans said, should be allowed discretion to establish "one or more" scales.

4. A breakdown of the entire rate structure might result from a provision in the bill decreasing that part of the benefit of the low, competitive "transcontinental" rates between Eastern Canada and the west coast must be passed on to territory in between. The transcontinental rates are set because of east-west water competition to the railways by way of the Panama Canal.

On the question of laying down a single scale for the whole country, Mr. Evans said he is afraid this would knock out certain "arbitrary" rates — not related to the mileage goods are hauled — which were favored by the Maritimes and industries.
