LAST OF FIVE LOCOMOTIVES DELIVERED

New Huge Streamlined C. N. R. Engines Both Serviceable And Economical.

MONTREAL, July 9—Locomotive 6404, last of the five huge streamlined locomotives constructed for use on the fast passenger trains of the Canadian National Railways, has been delivered to the National system by her builders, the Montreal Locomotive Works, and is now undergoing road tests before being placed in passenger service. The new class of locomotives, largest in the world and the first streamliners to operate on a Canadian railroad, have given very satisfactory performance in their test runs. Since a railroad locomotive requires to be "broken in," as does the family automobile, new engines are first placed on freight runs, under gradually increasing loads and speeds. The men of the running trains who have handled the new engines in their test runs are enthusiastic concerning their power and speed. During the breaking-in process, these locomotives have handled trains of more than 3500 tons considerably heavier than any trains they will ever haul in fast passenger service for which they were designed. Operating between Montreal and Brockville, the tests included hauling heavy loads, up the one per cent grade of Vaudreuil Hill, the governing grade on the line between Montreal and Toronto. In all test runs the engines have performed efficiently and economically. Speeds of fifty to sixty miles an hour were maintained with these heavy freight trains, and these tests have proved that the new locomotives possess sufficient reserve power to handle the heaviest passenger trains at much higher speeds. The engines will go into service on the route of the International Limited they are capable of maintaining continuous runs of 550 miles and a greater uninterrupted mileage if necessary. Operating requirements however, are more favorable to changing locomotives at Toronto so the engines stationed at Montreal will operate to Toronto one day and return next day. Other engines of this class will handle the fast passenger trains of the national system out of Toronto to Sarnia on route to Chicago.

Engine crews will be changed at divisional points on route but the locomotives will run between their respective terminals. Tests have shown that in high speed operation the streamlining applied to the new locomotives will fulfill expectations. This streamlining design was developed by J. H. Parkin, assistant director of the division of physics, National Research Council at Ottawa, his assistant Dr. J. J. Green and officers of the Motive Power Department, Canadian National Railways, extensive wind-tunnel tests being made with models, the design decided upon reduces air resistance at high speed to a minimum, and utilizing a louvre at the top of the streamlined front, it's smoke and cinders clear of the locomotive cab thus ensuring clear vision for the engineer and at the same time carrying the smoke of the locomotive clear of the train. An additional piece of equipment designed to add to the comfort of passengers riding behind the new engines, is the track-side sprinkler installed under the tender. By this device the track may be sprinkled with water from the tender before the passenger cars pass over it. The sprinkler device is controlled from the engine cab and it adds greatly to the comfort of travellers during hot dusty weather or when loose ballast is encountered at any point on line.

In designing this entirely new engine for Canadian service, the motive power experts had for their guidance several years of experience with the 6100 Northern model 5700 Hudson types of locomotives, the best features of each of which were embodied in the new power. The new locomotives, while the largest streamlined steam engines in the world, are not the heaviest locomotives in use on the Canadian National system.

They represent, however, the most advanced design in the art of steam locomotive construction, which in the past decade has witnessed the introduction and development

Comeback Staged On Mt'l. Market

(C.P. By Guardian's Special Wire)

MONTREAL, July 9—Late coming Montreal power, in most sections of today's stock market after profit taking jolted a number of early leaders.

Gains of as much as two points were the rule or liquor, construction and rail equipments but metals, banks, utilities and other issues were unable to rally. Papers held steady.

Revival of interest in rail equipments sent Canada Car preferred up to 18, highest since 1.33, before the price closed up 1-2 at 17 1-2. The common lost an early gain to decline 3-8 but National Steel and C. P. R. firmed slightly.

New highs for a year or more were shown by Building Products at 39 1-2 and Canada Cement preferred at 75, up 1-2 and a point respectively. Fracture strength was gained by Dominion Bridge Foundation, Gypsum Lime and Hamilton Bridge.

Distillers Seagrams spurred nearly two points to 23 in late buying and National Breweries preferred was up that much. Breweries common and Canadian Industrial Alcohol gained a little ground.

Little interest was shown in metals in late dealings and International Nickel at 49 3-4, Noranda at 58 3-4 and Hollinger at 15 1-2 declined 1-8 each. Smelters finished even.

Utilities were a bit mixed. Loss of 1 1-4 points was posted for Canadian Hydro-Electric preferred at 31 1-4 and B. C. Power Power Corporation and Canada Northern declined narrowly. Montreal Power and Brazilian Traction firmed.

Drops of one to eight points were registered by Bank of Montreal at 191, Nova Scotia at 2.85, Agnew-Surpass preferred at 98 and Ogilvie Flour preferred at 215. Papers were steady to slightly firmer. Sales 35,230 shares; bonds \$2,000.
