Gale-Driven Fire Destroys House

ALBERTON—The home of Mr. and Mrs. Angus MacBain, Locke Road near O'Leary, was destroyed by fire about 8 o'clock Sunday morning.

Almost all the furniture was saved but all clothing belonging to the six occupants of the dwelling was lost with the exception of what they were wearing at the time.

The blaze was discovered by a grandson of the home owners shortly after Mr. MacBain lit a fire in the kitchen stove.

Besides Mr. and Mrs. MacBain the building was occupied by their son-in-law and daughter, Mr. and Mrs. Calvin Carruthers and their two children.

The O'Leary fire brigade was called but by the time they had travelled the five miles to the scene the fire, driven by a strong gale, was far advanced.

The loss is partly covered by insurance.

Nuclear Ban Chat Speeded

GENEVA (Reuters) — The three-power talks on a nuclear weapons test ban continued to pick up speed Monday with a "big concession" from the West over the meaning of control posts to detect explosions.

Conference sources said British delegate Sir-Michael Wright, with the full backing of James J. Wadsworth of the United States, proposed that the Russians form a third of the technical staff of posts on Soviet territory.

Wright described Monday's proposal as a "big concession" and Wadsworth added that it was "one of the milestones of the conference," sources said.

STEP FORWARD
Soviet delegate Semyon Tsarapkin agreed that the plan appeared to be a "step forward," although he hoped it would not be the West's last offer.

But the West, which recently had shifted its "no-Russian" position to concede that four Russians could be allowed in each control post, said Monday's proposal was as far as it would go.
