

Presbyterian Men Plan Meet For Truro

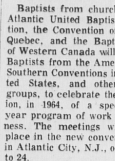
Plans for the seventh annual conference of Presbyterian Men to be held at the Nova Scotia Agricultural College in Truro on May 1 to 3 have been announced by Roderick Douglas of New Castle, N.B., Synod Council President, and by Roy Hamilton, national director, Toronto. The conference theme is "No Other Gods".

Guest speakers are to be the Rev. Dr. Kenneth G. McMillan, general secretary of the Canadian Bible Society, and the Rev. Basil E. Howell, comptroller of the Presbyterian Church in Canada. Both are from Toronto. Arrangements for the conference are under the direction of Mr. Douglas, Blair Macdonald, Charlottetown, a member of the national committee which sponsors the movement, and Rev. David Hawthiney, Picton, N.S., the Maritime Synod Convener of Evangelism and Social Action.

In commenting on the conference plans, Mr. Hamilton says, "The theme, 'No Other Gods', calls for an extremely personal self-examination on the part of each of us. As we meet together informally in our discussion sessions we will ask ourselves honestly what does come first in our lives—do we as men of the church have other gods?" Mr. Hamilton is a former director of sales promotion with General Motors of Canada Limited.

Rev. Kenneth G. McMillan, B.A., B.D., D.D., is a native of Mount Forest, Ontario. Following his graduation from Knox College in Toronto he held pastoral charges at Barzouze and Dun-

Celebrate Baptist Jubilee

Baptists from churches of the Atlantic United Baptist Convention, the Convention of Ontario, Quebec, and the Baptist Union of Western Canada will join with Baptists from the American and Southern Conventions in the United States, and other Baptist groups, to celebrate the centennial in 1964, of a special five-year program of work and witness. The meetings will take place in the new convention hall in Atlantic City, N.J., on May 22 to 24.

The five-year program, called The Baptist Jubilee Advance has seen the Atlantic United Baptist churches joining with the other groups in a year's emphasis. These emphasis have covered, church extension, evangelistic outreach, stewardship and finance, world mission, and teaching and training.

Program for the Atlantic City meetings is varied and extremely interesting. Metropolitan opera star Irene Jordan, member of the Baltimore Symphony Orchestra, and a chorus of 100 will be featured in the presentation of an oratorio specially written for the occasion. The oratorio, based on Psalm 8 is entitled "What is Man?" Also in attendance will be the Singing City Chorus of Philadelphia. Special guests will include Dr. John Sorensen, president of the Baptist World Alliance, evangelist Billy Graham, and the Hon. John G. Diefenbaker.

Many Atlantic Baptists, from churches in New Brunswick, Nova Scotia, Prince Edward Island and Newfoundland will be going to the meetings by special tour, sponsored by Baptist Fellowship Tours. The tour will be leaving Saint John on the morning of May 10, and will include a visit to the World's Fair in New York.

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The Christian and His Neighbor ILLUSTRATED SUNDAY SCHOOL LESSON By Alfred J. Buescher

THE CHRISTIAN CHARACTER

Jesus Placed Stress On Love

Those who insist that a proper concern himself only with "preaching the gospel" and forget about being a practical, moral teacher, will do well to remember that Jesus himself was a great practical and moral teacher. He frequently delivered parables in which he made answers to questions, gave direction to seekers or unimpaired of others, and pronounced to practical truths.

His sermon on the Mount is an excellent example of Jesus' practical, moral teachings. It contains very little gospel, but how rich in good works and moral teachings! Over and over, Jesus has told us the manner in which we are to live toward our fellow men, stressing the love which should abound throughout the Christian character.

In Luke 10:25-27, Jesus does far more than merely answer the lawyer's question concerning the Scriptures. First, He asks the questioner what the Scriptures say regarding the requirements for eternal life.

Knowing it would meet with Jesus' approval, the lawyer briefly summarizes Deuteronomy 6:5, 10:12 and Leviticus 19:18. Then, knowing full well he has not lived according to the Scripture, he attempts to justify himself with his conscience by asking Jesus who is his neighbor.

Jesus seizes the opportunity to lay down a profound, eternal truth and illustrates it with the parable of the Good Samaritan. The man who has been beaten, robbed and left for dead on the highway between Jerusalem and Jericho is completely ignored by the priest and the Levite. It is the Samaritan—a member of the hated race—who takes care of the injured man.

Real Peace is needed

One of your friends to define peace, the chances are you would get much the same answer from them all. About nine of them would describe peace as "the complete and enduring absence of war." As remarkable as such a definition would be to the world, it is at best a very inadequate description of the peace many are seeking.

The peace we pray for consists not in the state of "armed peace" or "cold war" which has held the world trembling for the last 20 years.

And it does not mean simply worldwide disarmament, which today that would be a most welcome advance in the state of world peace.

True peace cannot easily be defined in general terms. Perhaps St. Augustine's philosophical approach to our problem is as good a start as any. He puts it simply: "Peace is the tranquillity of order."

Pope John XXIII expressed the same idea in more specific terms: "It is evident that peace on earth, which men of every era have yearned for most eagerly, can be firmly established only if the order that flows from God is dutifully observed."

It is obvious that every piece of equipment must function perfectly if a machine is to accomplish the job it was made to do. In the Divine plan, each man an being was created to enjoy a promised happiness that derives from eternal union with God.

This happiness was to be the reward of a life of service to God through service to our neighbor. Such a life necessarily supposes that each individual enjoys certain definite rights and fulfills correspondingly defined obligations.

As Pope John expressed it, "Rights as well as duties find their source, their sustenance and their inviolability in the nature of things which grants or enjoins them."

"For example, the right of every man to live in cordiality with the duty to preserve it; his right to a decent standard of living with the duty to live it becomingly; and his right to investigate the truth freely with the duty of seeking it and possessing it even more completely and profoundly."

More than 1,600 years have passed since our Divine Saviour said, "Peace I leave with you, My peace I give to you, as the world gives I do I give to you." (St. John XIV, 27).

How willing man is to seek the peace the world gives and reject the peace Christ gives!

EXAMPLES

All around us we witness the example of individuals and large groups of people subjected to bitter injustices for no other reason than the color of their skin, their religious beliefs, their national loyalties.

In the very beginning of the Christian era, St. Paul boldly spoke out against such abuses. There is urgent need for all men to heed his words today.
