TARTE'S ATTACK ON

THE METHODISTS.

The Montreal Witness comments about Tarte's unjustifiable attack upon the Methodists of Anticosti and says:

"The Minister of Public Works was asked to state the facts upon which he based the charges made under the privileges of Parliament against the Fox Bay settlers of having lured vessels to destruction on the rocks, and he has never been able to state one fact or to adduce one tittle of evidence. Instead of this his personal organ repeats the charges, and gives way to rage in a series of wild and impotent threats of the terrible things the Minister of Public Works is going to do if the Methodists do not bow in silence to his libels. This is the old Chinese method of warfare of wearing hideous faces and beating tom-toms, which is said to have had quite an effect in scaring enemies of their own sort. The Patrie, which apparently worships wealth, and regards a rich man as incapable of mistakes, seems to think no other argument needed to prove the utter badness of the Methodists than to shout Menier's millions! Menier's millions! as though these had anything to do with the effort of Methodist missionaries to protect a few of their scattered sheep from slanders which they do not deserve." This is very much to the point.

TWO VITAL QUESTIONS.

Two important subjects are to be discussed at the coming session of the Ontario Medical Association. The Toronto World says:

"The programme provides for a whole day of papers and discussion on the subject of tuberculosis, which will be handled not only from the standpoint of cause and treatment, but from the more important stand of prevention. Prominent members of the medical profession from Canada and the United States will give their views on the subject. The paper on sanitariums for consumption will be read by Dr. Broditch of Boston, who is in charge of the city sanitarium a few miles out of Boston. An important committee is preparing a report under the chairmanship of Dr. Britton, of Toronto, on the injurious effect of Ontario's over-crowded school system. The question of the extent of the evil and who is responsible for it will be considered, as well as the possibility of having common rules to apply in urban and rural districts as to the scope of improvements of the hygienic and sanitary conditions of schools will be brought up and discussed in detail by the association."

These discussions will be watched with interest even from this distant point of view. That there is something wrong about the methods pursued in the public schools is manifest to every observant person. We shall see what the doctors of Ontario have to say about it.

NOTES AND COMMENTS.

—Marchand has wisely determined not to play the part of Boulanger. His chances of success, in any case, would have been extremely remote. The French people are not disposed to undertake a big political agitation on the eve of their great Exhibition—even if they had a very smart man to take the lead. Just at present there are plenty of mediocrities and imbeciles of the Deroulede type, but not one really able man.

NEWS NOTES.

There has been much written and said about the Queen's eyesight, but, in spite of official contradiction, it will not be at all astonishing if Her Majesty's eyes are beginning to fail her. At eighty years of age, one is not expected to have perfect eyesight, and cataract comes to very many people. The operation for this is quite a simple matter and, in Her Majesty's case, will be performed by Professor Pagenstecker, who is reckoned to be the best living authority on eyes.

Picquart Released.

PARIS, June 13.—Lieutenant-Colonel Picquart has been provisionally released from custody. Colonel Picquart's release, it is understood, was due to the fact that the German Foreign Office recently informed the French Government that Col. Schwarzkopf wrote the petit bleu, and that, therefore, it was impossible that Picquart should have forged it. Figaro publishes an interview with Col. Picquart. In reply to the remark that it was due to him that Dreyfus was returned to France, he said: "That is true," and he dilated upon the emotions of Dreyfus upon receiving the news of his release, adding: "But for the miracle of the petit bleu it is impossible to say what would have happened." The Government is doing its utmost to keep the exact date and circumstances of the arrival of Captain Dreyfus a secret. It is said he will be disembarked a few miles from Brest.

Trial of Officers.

PRETORIA, June 10.—The trial of the 8 alleged former British officers, who were arrested at Johannesburg on May 16th, on the charge of high treason in having attempted to enroll men with a view to an outbreak of rebellion, began here yesterday. The charge against Lieutenant F. J. Tremlett, Lieut C. A. Ellis and Lieut John Allen Mitchell was withdrawn and they were called as witnesses for the state. Lieut Ellis testifies that overtures were made to him to hold Johannesburg and the forts until the British troops came. He was given to understand that the co-operation of the military authorities had been secured and that capitalists were financing the movement, but he deposed that he did not know the names of the leaders of the movement. Captain Patterson, formerly of the Lancers, and Colonel R. F. Nicholls, on account of their alleged connection with the military authorities, are being defended at the instance of the Imperial Government, with a view of eliciting proof that no British official has any knowledge of the matter.

Milner's Mission.

CAPE TOWN, June 10.—Sir Alfred Milner, British High Commissioner for South Africa, returned yesterday from Bloemfontain, and was received with great popular enthusiasm. The Volksraad of the Orange Free State, in secret session, has endorsed all that President Kruger did at the conference with Sir Alfred Milner.

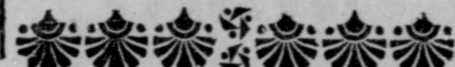
