Appoint Deputy Postmaster Gen.

OTTAWA (CP) — George A. Boyle, 61-year-old six-foot, Wednesday was named as the next Deputy Postmaster General of Canada's \$158,570,000-a-year post office department.

Prime Minister Diefenbaker announced Mr. Boyle is to succeed Walter J. Turnbull Dec. 1. The announcement spelled out a Horatio Alger-type success story to the department's 50,000 employees from coast to coast.

For 42 years ago George Boyle, as a junior clerk, joined the department he soon is to head. He has remained with it continuously.

Mr. Boyle, a well-built former baseball and hockey player, enthused quietly at the news of his promotion. Since last April 1 he had been associate deputy PMG. "I am happy personally, of course," he said, "but for the service generally it is the best possible example of a career appointment."

Son of a former Laurentian highlands woods superintendent, Mr. Boyle was born at Manitowish, Que., 70 miles north of Ottawa.

He received his early education in Ottawa schools and took the first year of the University of Ottawa's arts course. In 1915 he joined the post office department.

He played for several seasons as an amateur with Ottawa City League baseball and hockey teams.

CONTRACT BRIDGE

Your right hand opponent deals and bids Three Hearts, both sides vulnerable. What do you bid now with each of the following four hands?

- 1. ♠AQJ72 ♥8 ♦KJ84 ♣AQ5
2. ♠J5 ♥KJ6 ♦AJ2 ♣AKQ93
3. ♠AKJ964 ♥3 ♦KQ ♣AQ72
4. ♠KQ62 ♥AK54 ♦J743 ♣5

1. Double. The double of an opening bid requests partner to bid his best suit and advises him that the doubler has a very good hand. The responder, if he also has a good hand, represents it not only by replying in his long suit but also by jumping the bidding to show his values.

The responder is permitted to pass the double whenever, in his judgment, he thinks it is better to play for penalties. In such cases he must have substantial strength in the opponent's suit. It would be improper to pass over three hearts or merely bid three spades. The all-round strength is best shown by the infernal double. The ultimate disposition of the hand is left to partner.

2. Three notrump. The purpose of the preemptive three bid is to make it not only as difficult as possible for the opponents to enter the bidding, but also to cramp their bidding space so that there is not much room for the exchange of information.

It is not surprising, therefore, that awkward problems sometimes present themselves to the opposition. The recommended three notrump bid is somewhat dangerous because of the gap in spades, but any other bid is at least as dangerous. There is a reasonable chance that partner will provide the moderate strength needed to make nine tricks.

3. Four spades. The single-handed undertaking of a spade game is clearly indicated. Of course, partner may have the worst hand in the world, and it is possible to be badly beaten, but this remote contingency should be given little weight. It is far more likely partner will provide the few values necessary to make a game, and in some cases the leap to four spades may stir his interest in a slam. Calculated risks must frequently be taken against preemptive bids.

4. Pass. Although there is a chance partner's hand may provide enough strength to make a game, or perhaps a part score, it is much too dangerous to act at this point before the left-hand opponent's strength is known. It would be unsafe to overcall with three spades, and it would be similarly reckless to make an infernal double. Wait-and-see tactics are in order, with the hope reserved that the next player will pass and partner will act.

Local Station Opposes License For Inverness TV Satellite

OTTAWA (CP) — The CBC board of governors today heard applications for licences to operate a new television satellite broadcasting station at Inverness, N.S.

Cape Breton Broadcasters Limited, operators of CJBK-TV, Sydney, N.S. applied for the satellite.

N. Nathanson said his Sydney station now cannot serve Cape Breton because of technical limitations that would be overcome in part by a satellite at Inverness.

The TV satellite, on channel 6 with power of 20 kilowatts and 10 kilowatts audio, would serve the western part of Cape Breton and the eastern part of the Nova Scotia mainland.

R. F. Large of CFCY-TV, Charlottetown, opposed the application because he said, the satellite's coverage would overlap his station coverage in Prince Edward Island.

Mr. Nathanson said he has no intention of seeking business in P.E.I.

Mr. Large said the proposed power of the satellite is too high. The satellite, in effect, would become a full-scale TV station. Satellites so far licensed have power of less than one kilowatt video.

Mr. Large asked for a deferment of the Sydney application until there is a definition of a satellite. He suggested a power limit might be placed on satellites.

Mr. Nathanson said the proposed high power is necessary to complete the coverage of his station and serve some 50,000 persons in the satellite area.

A. D. Dunton, board chairman, said transport department policy is to limit satellites to 100 watts, unless special circumstances such as topography required higher power.

Mr. Large said satellites should have only low power and serve only smaller areas.

Kiwanis Name New Governor

TORONTO (CP) — B. Kenneth Hibbert of Halifax was elected governor of the Ontario-Quebec-Maritimes district of Kiwanis International Wednesday at the closing business session of the annual convention.

Mr. Hibbert is the fourth Maritimer to be made district governor. The 46-year-old insurance executive has been a Kiwanian since 1945.

The session passed a resolution asking the federal government to designate a national flat as soon as possible.

It also asked the 163 clubs which make up the Kiwanis district in North America to plan programs to develop interest in good books by children. This included co-operating with schools and libraries in making such literature available and persuading parents of their responsibility in this regard.

The three-day convention was attended by 1,100 Kiwanians and Divisional lieutenants elected included: Jack Paul, Val d'Or, Que.; Zolique L'Esperance, St. Lawrence area; George Gouin, Trois-Rivières, Que.; J. B. Cosman, Moncton, N.B.; Alfred Bruce, Truro, N.S.; Chester Levy Digby, N.S.; and George Chalke, St. John's, Nfld.

Home Building Continues Slow

OTTAWA (CP) — Housing construction continued to lag behind last year's rate during August, the Central Mortgage and Housing Corporation reported Saturday.

In a preliminary report covering centres of 5,000 and more population, the Crown company said housing starts for the month of 8,743 units were 3.3 per cent below a year earlier.

Starts for the first eight months of the year now total 46,419 units compared with 61,803 in the corresponding period of 1956.

In the five regions of Canada, August starts were higher than last year only in Quebec, where they rose to 2,555 from 2,293. Month figures for other regions, with August, 1956 totals in brackets: Atlantic 204 (338); Ontario 3,490 (3,507); Prairie 1,632 (1,953); British Columbia 862 (952).

Builders completed 5,622 units across the country in August compared with 7,405 a year earlier—a drop of 23.7 per cent. For the first eight months of the year completions totalled 47,025 compared with 57,959.
