Anglican Laymen Hold Father And Son Banquet

35% Do Not Reach Grade 12

Clarence Mercer, Summerside High School Supervisor, addressed the Summerside Home and School welfare group at Civic Auditorium Tuesday night taking for his subject "The problem of drop-outs." Mr. Mercer quoted statistics to show that in Canada about 35 percent of our pupils drop out of school before they reach Grade XII, and the speaker considered that class enrollments in Summerside showed that we have about the same percentage of drop-outs here.

Some of the causes for students dropping out of school were 1. Economic pressure forcing them to go to work. 2. Indifferent attitude on the part of their parents. 3. Lack of interest in the school work. This last one, Mr. Mercer contended, was the result of the curriculum being unsuited to their particular needs and aptitudes.

Our present system of education on the Island tends to take for granted that all pupils have equal capacities for learning and so everyone is compelled to take the same academic courses, whether they want to go to college or not.

It would be fine, he said, if some of the boys and girls could come to school in the morning and work in the afternoon if that could be arranged with the business houses. Their morning studies could be along the line of their work, whether as mechanics, bookkeepers or what have you.

The speaker concluded that deficiencies in our curriculum were at least partly responsible for many of the drop-outs.

Mrs. J.A. Clark, president of the group, thanked the speaker for his address, and announced that the next meeting would be devoted to a discussion of social welfare. The meeting then broke up into discussion groups after which refreshments were served in the Home Economics room of the high school.

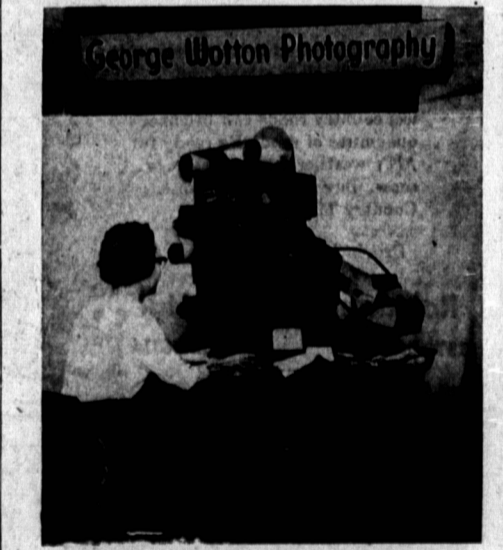
