House of Assembly.

DEBATE ON THE ADDRESS.

[THE EXAMINER'S SUMMARY REPORT.]

FRIDAY, March 25.

The House met at eleven o'clock this forenoon, when Mr. Rogers resumed the debate on the address. He dealt with the trade question in some length and gave figures showing the great difference in the quantity of certain articles sent to the old country as compared with the quantity of the same articles sent to that "great natural market of 65,000,000," the United States. He pointed out the great disparity there was in the value of exports sent to the English market and the value of those sent to the United States market, showing a difference in favor of the former of \$14,000,000. Unrestricted reciprocity, the policy of the Grit party, he said meant nothing more nor less than ultimate annexation. He thought the reference in the speech to the death of the Duke of Clarence was appropriate, and it would be well that this House should pass a resolution of condolence with Her Majesty the Queen in her bereavement.

Mr. Bell followed. He referred, in opening, to a statement of Prof. Harcourt to the effect that the McKinley tariff was not an unmixed evil to the people of this province. Inasmuch as it would cause them to go more fully into stock-raising in the future than they had in the past, and said there was nothing in the statement that was inconsistent with the teachings of the Liberal party, as the leader of the Opposition had said. Then he took up the decrease in the population as shown by the census, and also touched upon the question of taxation, objecting to a statement made by a member of the Opposition that taxation had not increased under the Conservative administration, claiming that we now paid into the Treasury three times more than we paid when we entered into the Confederation. The late Government, he said, was entitled to the thanks of the farming community for establishing a chair of agriculture in the Prince of Wales College, and the present administration was also deserving of thanks for following in their footsteps. He thought, however, that there was nothing in the statement that was inconsistent with the teachings of the Liberal party, as the leader of the Opposition had said. AFTERNOON SESSION.

Mr. Shaw proceeded to show that the professions and practices of the government party in respect to improved facilities for the Southport Ferry, or the bridging of the Hillsborough, were very different. He quoted the words of Mr. Peters, Mr. McDonald and others when in opposition, showing that the bridging of the Hillsborough was at that time a plank in the policy of the Opposition. But the Government has been dumb about the matter now that, having captured the votes of the electors they are in office. No greater facilities have been afforded. Not even a waiting room has been supplied on this side of the river. In respect to the Government, the Government began in hypocrisy and ended in treachery. Mr. Shaw then referred to the proposed improvements in respect to dairying. He said that he agreed with Professor Harcourt that the McKinley Tariff would prove to be a blessing to our farmers. The result of improved dairying in Ontario has been most successful. The export of Canadian cheese now aggregates nearly \$10,000,000, worth the chief part of which had gone to Great Britain, only \$13,495 having gone to the market of the Great Republic. He quoted the following statistics of exports from Canada in the year ending 30th June, 1891:

He hoped that P. E. Island would soon be able to make a better showing in comparison with other Provinces.

Hon. Mr. Sinclair deprecated a long debate at this stage. He contended that the Land Office had been badly managed by the Liberal-Conservative party, and that, if for nothing else, it was on this account well for the country that there had been a change of government. He defended the present management of the Government Stock Farm, and said that the Farm had been financially successful in the past year. The cattle there were never purer bred or better than they are at present. But the only breeds there are Shorthorn and Ayrshire.

Hon. Mr. Arsenault criticised strongly the operation of the Land Office Act,—the giving away of 17 per cent. in the first place, and the whole of the compound interest in the second place. He contended that the compound interest was not to be collected everyone should know it, and all should have the advantage of the reduction. Instead of this, the whole of the compound interest was obtained only by a favored few. If favored were to be given, they should be in favor of the poor man. But the Government measure operated in favor of the rich man and to the prejudice of the poor man. There is no justice or fair play in the Land Office policy of the Government. As to the Stock Farm, it is surprising to know that they have 1500 bushels of oats to sell. Instead of a Stock Farm it is now an oat farm. The oats grown on it are not fed to the stock. In respect to the Legislature, he thought that one house was quite sufficient for this small Province—not larger than many municipalities. He thought that two Houses of the Legislature is one too many.

Hon. Mr. McMillan contended that the Land Office was never more cheaply managed than it is at present, and that the work of the past season was particularly heavy. The staff of the office were compelled to work long after hours. We have now 76 farms which might be sold by private sale, and these will not realize one-third of the amounts against them. He contended
