Consider Japan's Atomic Plant Purchases Launch Trade War

LONDON (Reuters) — Japan's decision last week to buy two atomic power plants—one from the United States and one from Britain—has launched a world atomic trade "war" in earnest, say nuclear experts here.
Repeat orders involving many millions of dollars are at stake. They will go to the country which the Japanese judge has turned out the better or more practical station.
Daggers were drawn between the atom salesmen of the U.S. and Britain when in Tokyo earlier this month, W. Kenneth Davis of the U.S. Atomic Energy Commission said British atomic power stations are "expensive, cumbersome, and belonging to the atomic dark ages."
British experts have dropped all pretence at polite rivalry and are hitting back hard at the Americans, who they accuse of "atomic hucksterism."
British experts say that at Calder Hall Britain has the world's first industrial-sized nuclear power plant actually working, and that there is none in operation in America.

NEW YORK (AP)—I've been sleeping pretty steady for 30-odd years now, give or take a few nights when there were more important things to do. Always thought this made me something of an expert.
Now comes a fellow name of Norman Dine to tell me I've been doing the morpheus bit all wrong; my methods are shockingly unscientific in this atomic age.
Dine should know. Not only has he been sleeping fairly steady for some 50 years but he's also been spending a lot of sleepless nights dreaming up gadgets to help other people sleep.
His "sleep shop" in sleepless Manhattan bristles with slumber-inducing gadgets. He's so enthusiastic about them, you'd think he sells them. He does.
INDUCED BOREDOM
Suppose you can't sleep because, silly as it sounds, you're just too wide awake. The sure fire but old-fashioned way would be to get a jug and sip on it until you fall senseless to the coverlet. That's wrong—at least scientifically.
The ultra-modern method is a "sleep self-starter," a busy little machine that fills your headchamber with such a monotonous drone that you're forced to sleep in self-defence, out of sheer boredom. It's less painful in the morning, too.
Suppose the sandman won't come because you're too tense, unable to relax. A box-like affair vibrates those tense muscles—and



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May Mark Turning Point In Eisenhower Program

WASHINGTON (AP)—If President Eisenhower's new foreign aid bill becomes law without major change, it will mark a turning point in the history of the program.
Foreign aid officials make no bones about their wish to get away from the arduous task of running the gauntlet twice each year to get congressional approval for a politically unappealing program: once for an authorization, the second time for the money.
They said too that military assistance and a large amount of the economic help should go into the defence budget because it is part of the over-all security program and that other types of economic aid will be more effective if programmed over the long term rather than on a year-by-year basis. It's hard, they assert, to plan on a hand-to-mouth basis.
But already some congressmen are saying Eisenhower's plan will have to undergo "drastic revision" to retain for Congress the control of overseas spending.

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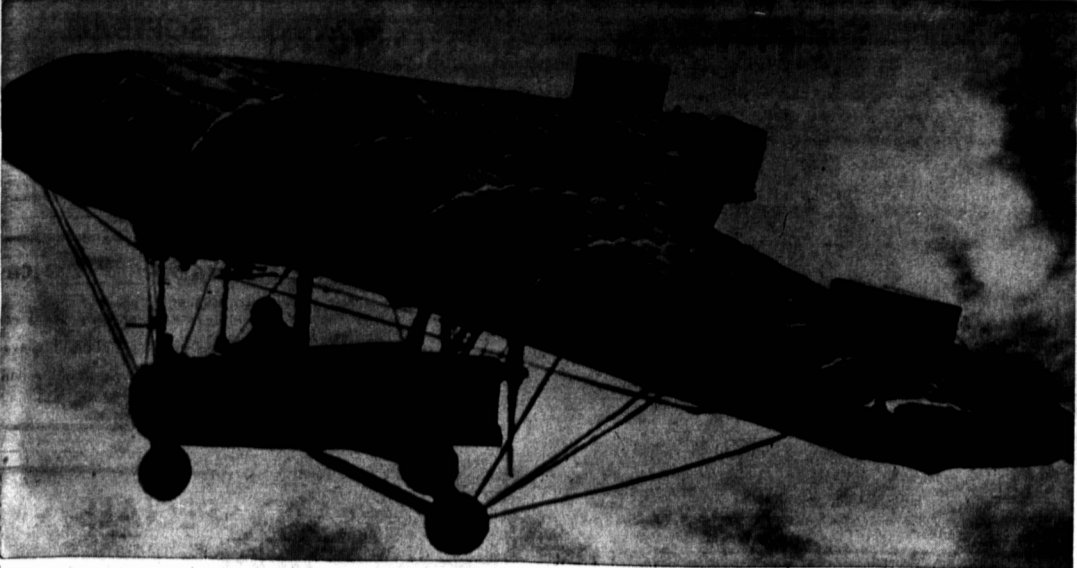

Anti-Semitism Outbreaks In Germany Are Cause Of Alarm

BONN, Germany (Reuters)—Church and civic leaders are expressing alarm at the outbreak of anti-Semitic feeling and Nazi flag-waving recently displayed in various parts of Germany.
Bishop Otto Dibelius, head of the German Evangelical Church, warned here Friday that recent desecration of Jewish cemeteries in West Germany indicates a "regrowth of anti-emitic tendencies."
He said the desecrations were a symptom of a lack of respect that characterized the present age.
Posters offering rewards for information leading to the arrest of culprits who devastated a cemetery on Hitler's birthday, April 20, still hang in the town of Salzger. The raiders overturned about 80 gravestones and a 20-ton memorial.

The words came from Maurice St. Laurent 70 owner of his father's old general store in this Quebec village birthplace of him and Prime Minister St. Laurent his brother.
