DEER TIMES IN ENGLAND.—The cotton mills at Hayfield, Derbyshire, owned by T. H. Sibleton, member of parliament for Staffordshire, have been closed, owing to the depression in the cotton trade. The stoppage of these mills has thrown three thousand people out of work.

DESERVES CREDIT.—The man who fed the animal from which the splendid beef, shown by Messrs. Blake Bros., this forenoon, was obtained, deserves great credit. We learn that Mr. John Macdonald, of Ten Mile House, Lot 49, was the man. The animal was a fine cow, weighing 1,500 pounds.

STILL TO THE FRONT.—Mr. Robert Baird has fitted up new and commodious quarters in J. D. McLeod's building on Grafton Street, where he is now conducting business. THE WHEEL.—It has been decided that the bicycle race between Messrs. F. de C. Davies and W. W. Moore shall take place on Wednesday next. The contestants will leave New Perth at four o'clock in the afternoon. The finish will be at or near the residence of Mr. Sprague, Southport. Messrs. B. C. Prowse and Gordon Alley are to be the judges, and Mr. Fred. J. Nash, referee.

BREAK IN HAY.—The most disastrous break in the hay market during the present season occurred on Friday and Monday last, when prices in London, Liverpool and Bristol went down with a crash to 65s. on Canadian hay, a drop of 20s. to 30s. per ton compared with prices a short time previous. "Never," said a hay exporter to the writer, "have I experienced such an utter collapse in anything as that which has taken place in the hay export trade during the past week."—Trade Bulletin.

NEAT!—The Amherst News says:—Mr. J. Lusty has a dog that has shown a remarkable degree of intelligence. Last week when tied leaving to the tender mercy of the cold water a brood of little motherless chickens. The dog taking cognizance of their friendless plight, undertook their protection and is carefully performing the motherly services of which they stand in need. When cold the dog shelters them, when hungry provides food, and at all times protects them from danger.

A PROFITABLE CONCERN.—The annual meeting of the Amherst Lout and shoe manufacturing company was held at that place a few days ago. The report on the past year's work was most satisfactory, there being a decided increase in the sales. Last year the sales amounted to \$425,000; the previous year they amounted to \$370,000. The usual dividend will be paid on June 1st. The proposal to open a wholesale house in Halifax was ratified. The old board of directors were re-appointed. The company employ about two hundred hands, and last paid out in wages the sum of \$64,000.

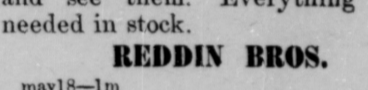
