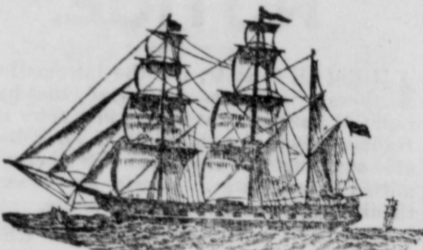

CURRENT NOTES.

M. Godard, the famous French aeronaut is dead.

The Queen has granted pensions of £100 each to the four sisters of John Leech, the artist.

Earl Carnarvon will start from Belfast on Monday next on a tour of the north of Ireland, return on the 16th inst.

The Germans will arm their military stations at Zanzibar with Krupp guns. The Sultan of Pangani has placed his territory under German protection.

The Czar and Czarina and the rest of the Russian imperial party have arrived at Copenhagen. Large crowds welcomed the visitors and gave them an ovation.

The Emperor William, the Empress Augusta and the entire Imperial family have promised to attend Christine Nilsson's Berlin season next November.

The German press continually warns poor Germans from emigrating to England, where they state similar distress to that prevailing throughout Germany exists.

Three Casdhar regiments were recently ordered to proceed to Herat, but they refused to go. The natives of Casdhar openly wish the English to occupy that city.

The employment of bicyclists as scouts for the intelligence department in the Austrian military manoeuvres proved a great success. They surpassed horsemen in endurance.

Mr. Tennant, lately M. P. for Leeds, will commence next November the publication in Rome of a semi-weekly journal in the interest of the American and English colonies there.

The Vienna observatory has discovered a star of the seventh magnitude in the nebula of the constellation of Andromeda. It is a question whether it is a new star or an old one shining through the nebula.

There is food for the reflection in the remark which was recently made of a camp-meeting held this summer near Baltimore, that "the number of conversions was limited, but financially it was success."

The *Nieuw Freie Presse* says: An Anglo-Chinese alliance would open a new phase of the Russian question and guarantee the peace of the world. This much is certain, England's decadence is still far distant.

The secretary of the Indian association at Calcutta telegraphs that native opinion strongly condemns Lord Randolph Churchill's attack upon the Marquis of Ripon, and that the press unanimously defends the Marquis.

"I was never exactly buried alive," said an old clerk, recounting his experiences, "but I once worked a week in a store that did not advertise. When I came out my head was almost as white as you now see it. Solitary confinement did it."—*Cincinnati Gazette*.

The Toronto Hunt Club sent congratulations to Lord Lorne on the anniversary of his birth. The following reply has been received:—"Pray accept my best thanks. I thank the members of the Club for their most kind remembrance of me. I often wish I were again in your country, thinking it one of the best in the world."

A tall, lank man boarded an out-going western train near the stock yard. He looked like a farmer; and there was an odor of cattle car about his clothes. He walked through the car and looked about for a seat, but nobody stirred to make room for him. A drummer was spread over two seats, and a woman and her two children over three. Several men occupied a whole seat apiece. The tall, lank man gazed up and down the car a moment and then exclaimed: "Well, by gosh, I cum up to Chicago with a load of hogs, but I'll be darned if I thought I'd have ter ride home with a load too."—*Chicago Herald*.

At the Cutlers' banquet, at Sheffield, on the 4th inst., Mr. Phelps replied to the toast to the American minister, and was heartily cheered. He said he regarded the welcome as an indication of a similar feeling throughout England toward America, which reciprocated and echoed the sentiments of love, honor and devotion just expressed toward the Queen. He was glad the Government had instituted an enquiry into the trade depression, which was equally existent in America. He thought the depression was somewhat due to the haste to get rich, luxurious living, and the flooding of the world with goods that are not required, and hence do not pay for their production. In conclusion, Mr. Phelps said that if any word of his should linger in the English mind, his first and last wish was for a continuance of the brotherly feeling between the English speaking people of the world, whose peaceful dominance gave the best hope for an enlightened, noble and Christian civilization.

CURRENT NOTES.

The Great Eastern is to be offered for sale.

Russia is said to have resumed her military activity.

The Government of Holland is about to adopt additional protective duties.

Mr. Burgess, Deputy Minister of the Interior, has come to the Maritime Provinces on a holiday trip.

The Rhone Valley has been swept by a terrible cyclone which uprooted many trees and destroyed a large number of houses.

At Tournafulla, County Limerick, Fathers Murphy and Clifford, assisted by about 200 people, have built a cottage for evicted widows.

The Canada Temperance Act has been declared in force in the Counties of Lincoln and Middlesex, after the expiry of the present licenses.

Advices from Allahabad says it is believed Gen. Roberts will urge an increase of the Indian army by 10,000 British troops and 1,700 natives.

He wished to impress a feeling for neatness upon his olive branches, and, pointing to the surf, observed to them: "You will perceive that even the sea is tidy."

General de Courcy, the French commander in Annam, telegraphs from Hue that several disorders have occurred in Quinhon. Numerous Christians have been massacred and a number of villages burned.

The Pope assisted at ceremonies attending the erection of a bronze statue of St. Peter on the summit of the monument erected to the memory of the Ecumenical Council of 1870, which stands in the garden of the Vatican.

A bitter spirit of hostility is manifested between Germans and Czechs in Bohemia, and outbreaks are continually occurring. At a military camp at Posen a riot broke out between German and Czech soldiers, and many persons were injured.
