P.E.I. Credit Union League Observes 20th Anniversary

Twenty years of achievement will be observed by the P. E. I. Credit Union League which meets today in annual session. The phenomenal growth of the credit union movement in the province can be seen in the fact that during this period of time membership has increased from under 2,000 to almost 10,000.

In the same interval the number of credit unions has grown from 25 to 60. Their total assets now exceed \$1,283,152 with savings of \$1,156,751.

Perhaps the greatest achievement of the credit union movement in the Province is the fact that in the past twenty years they have been able to loan to their members a total of \$7,933,400. Most of these loans were for \$200 and less would indicate that the credit union continues to cater to the needs of the small borrower.

It is to the credit of the executives of the various unions throughout the Province that the amount written off to the Guarantee Fund during the past 25 years has been less than .05 of one per cent of the loans granted.

In addition to the savings and thrift program offered by credit unions, the members' savings are insured dollar for dollar as are all loans made.

Present for the annual meeting today will be Mr. O. H. Edgerton, General Manager of CUNA Mutual Insurance Society from Madison, Wisconsin. He will be the special speaker at a banquet to be held in the evening.
