

# Canadian-American Games Will Be Held in Winnipeg

—SNO PAULO, Brazil (CP-AP)—Winnipeg was chosen Monday as the site for the fifth Pan-American Games, scheduled in 1967.

Selection of the Manitoba city, announced by the Pan American Sports Organization while athletes from 21 countries were competing here in the fourth Pan-American Games, set the Winnipeg delegation literally jumping for joy.

"We're very, very happy to have the games," said Alderman Mark Dandz spokesman here for Mayor Stephen Juch of Winnipeg.

ambassador to Brazil and the head of the Pan American Games Committee in Canada.

The Canadian made the low charges for food and lodging for athletes in the Games village, which is promised that the village will be no more than 10 minutes from downtown Winnipeg and no more than 30 minutes

from all competition centres. They also stressed that the Games would fall during Canada's 1967 centennial celebrations and would coincide with the world's fair in Montreal.

When a reporter told the Winnipeg delegation of the decision, the delegates actually jumped up and down with joy.

Winnipeg had supported its bid with a prepared brief in which it said the estimated \$130,000 cost of putting on the Games would be underwritten by the federal, provincial and municipal governments.

The brief said Winnipeg already has facilities to handle track and field, boxing, wrestling, soccer, equestrian sports, basketball, tennis, gymnastics, a military pentathlon, baseball, rowing, fencing, tennis, yachting and weightlifting. Facilities would have to be constructed only for aquatic and cycling events.

## Former Fielders Great Recalls Performing For \$2

By STUART LAKE OTTAWA (CP)—Former fans of the 1950s remember when Canadian players in the Eastern Big Four performed in the 100th anniversary series they received out-of-town games plus their meals and all the beer they could drink.

They remember, too, that many players were in 1960 for the full 60 minutes of the game unless they were rested.

They also remember big Dave Sprague when he was one of the heroes of the Big Four. Weighing 250 pounds and standing six-foot-five, he was noted for busting through the line as a flying wing roughly equivalent to full-back today in offensive.

When his club lost possession, Sprague moved into his tackle position (middle wing) and he helped break up the enemy's back.

Sprague says the game today is better to watch because the players are specialists and play full time, at football. Players of the 1950s were generalists.

## Parents Give Sherman \$100,000 Year Pact

NEW YORK (AP) — New York Giants took up coach Al Sherman's offer to give him a new five-year pact Monday at a reported \$700,000 a year as reward for leading the club to two straight Eastern conference titles in the National Football League.

Jack Mara, president of the Giants, announced at the club's news conference that the club has scrapped the old three-year contract running through 1963.
