

## All-Stars Come From Behind To Tie Wings

DETROIT, (AP)—Gus Mortson and Doug Mohns drilled in two long second-period goals Saturday night to give the All-Stars a 2-2 tie with the champion Detroit Red Wings in the eighth annual National Hockey League all-star game in Olympic Stadium.

Starting at a fast pace, the Red Wings took a 2-0 lead in the first period on a pair of goals by inmates Alex Delvecchio and Gordie Howe.

But the All-Stars, playing together for the first time, gained momentum and outplayed the Red Wings for the rest of the game.

Mortson, veteran defenceman of Chicago Black Hawks, scored at 1:19 of the middle period when

his 50-foot screen shot bounced off the skate of Bob Goldham, Red Wing defenceman, and flew into the net.

Mohns, Boston's promising sophomore, tied it at 13:10. He skated down the left side, cut in toward the goal and beat net minder Terry Sawchuk with a high, hard 35-footer.

The All-Stars platooned their goals, Toronto's Harry Lumley played the first 30 minutes and was nicked for both Red Wing goals. Al Rollins of Chicago finished out the game and handled 13 shots without error.

Delvecchio scored at 9:50 of the first period on a close-in thrust. Howie Clark at 19:55 with a 10-foot backhand while the All-Stars were two men short.

# N.Y. Giants Sweep World Series

## Humble Cleveland 7-4 In Final On Saturday

CLEVELAND (AP)—The tremendous New York Giants humbled the stunned Cleveland Indians in four straight games to become the first National League world series winners since 1946 by grabbing Saturday's loosely played, 7-4 finale.

Leo Durocher's opportunists piled up an early 7-0 lead for Don Liddle, then knuckled on Hoyt Wilhelm's dancing knuckler and finally 21-game winner Johnny Antonelli to stave off the dying gasps of the futile Tribe.

Not since 1922 when the Giants of John McGraw rode over New York Yankees had a National League champ won a series without defeat. The 1922 sweep, was somewhat blemished by one tie game.

Cleveland, winningest team in American League history with 111 victories, suffered the same shocking fate as the Chicago Cubs of 1906 whose 116 triumphs still stands as the major league high. Those old-time Cubs, however, did manage to cop a couple from the White Sox.

**BIG GATE WIPED OUT**

Down the drain with Cleveland's proud record of never losing a world series went a \$500,000 Sunday gate.

The Giants, 17-10 underdogs, never let the Tribe off the floor. After taking the 10-inning opener 5-2 and beating Early Wynn in the 31 second game, they moved into Cleveland's home park to floor the Tribe for the third time, 6-2, and finally put them out for the count.

Antonelli, the young lefthander the Giants' snared from Milwaukee with Liddle in the trade for Bobby Thomson, officiated at the burial services.

Wilhelm had put down a seventh-inning Cleveland threat that produced one run but was in a jam with two on and one out in the eighth when Durocher called for Antonelli.

The Rochester, N. Y. youngster blew a third strike past Vic Wertz, whose eight hits were high for the series. Wally Westlake looked at the last real threat.

Antonelli walked Sam Dente opening the ninth but got Jim Hegan to foul out, and fanned pinch-hitter Dave Philley. Dale Mitchell, batting for Dave Pope, lofted a feeble foul pop to third baseman Hank Thompson who gathered the foully in his glove.

A hilarious Giant bench swarmed from the dugout for an impromptu victory celebration near the spot where Thompson made the final out that ended seven years of American League series domination. The last Nations to win were St. Louis Cards in 1946 and it took them seven games.

**RHODES RODE BENCH**

The Giants did it Saturday with Durocher's pinch-hitting hero of the first three triumphs who finished the series on the bench with a .667 batting average. Monte Irvin, left field starter in every game, helped wrap it up with a double and single that knocked in two of the seven runs.

The big crowd of 78,102 that piled up a record gate of \$400,000 for a single game saw the Indians put up more fight in their last gasp than they had Friday. Despite that early 7-0 deficit, they made it reasonably close in the final stages so Durocher had to dig into his deeply-stacked bullpen.

Liddle, the half-pint left with the well-controlled curve, had Cleveland at his mercy through the first four innings, allowing only one hit. Two successive errors, one by himself when he failed to touch first base while fielding a throw, and another by Dave Williams, set it up for Hank Majeski to deliver a three-run pinch homer in the fifth.

Majeski's homer was only the fifth by a pinch hitter in series competition but the second in this particular set.

After singles by Wertz, Jim Hegan and pinch-hitter Rudy Regalado added up to another run in the seventh, Durocher called for Wilhelm. Dave Pope hit weakly to the mound to end the inning.

Bob Lemon, who went the route in the first game and was trying to come back with only two days' rest, was charged with the first six New York runs. The other was charged to Hal Newhouse, former Detroit southpaw, who relieved

Mueller's three singles made him the Giant series leader with seven hits, followed by Dark's six.

It was a team triumph, as Durocher said in the joyous Giant clubhouse.

**GIANT SCORING**

In the second inning Hank Thompson got his first of three walks during the day. Irvin then doubled, sending Thompson to third.

Dave Williams lined to Wertz at first but the converted outfielder trying for a double play, threw into left field, letting Thompson score as Irvin raced to third.

Wally Westlake who got under Wes Westrum's fly ball, only to let it dribble out of his glove in his eagerness to get away a quick throw, Irvin scored. Manager Al Lopez, the Indians claimed Westlake had held the ball long enough for an out but was overruled.

The Dark - Mueller hit-and-run combination put men on first and third in the third, and Willie Mays doubled over Al Rosen's head. Dark scored.

**ROOF FALLS IN**

In the fifth, Dark singled to left, Mueller singled to right and the Giants were off and running. When Lemon walked Mays, Newhouse came in. He walked Thompson to force in a run and served up a ball that Irvin hit to left field for a two-run single. Then he was yanked.

The three runs were charged to Lemon because he put the runners on base. Ray Narjeski replaced Hal and managed to retire the side with only one more run, Thompson scoring on Westrum's sacrifice fly.

That did it for the Giants who had only to protect any share of their 7-0 bulge.

The Indians accepted defeat gracefully, which perhaps tells some of the story of the series.

In the final analysis, the Giants were more alert to their opportunities. They hit in the clutch, made the fielding plays that had to be made and simply were a better ball club.

Mays' first-game catch on Wertz, who finished with a .500 average, was the top defensive thrill. The Tribe batted only 190 in the series and left 37 men stranded.

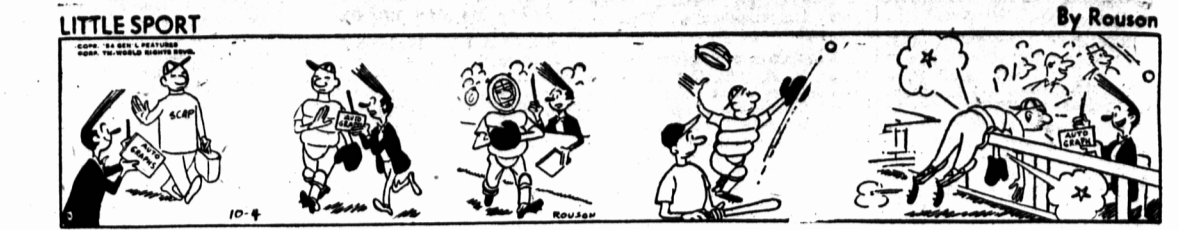
