Prominent Educationist Eaton Guest At Pugwash

PUGWASH, N.S. (CP) Thirteen United States college presidents will spend the next eight days here reading, studying and discussing "the philosophic and psychological bases of liberal arts education."

Cyrus S. Eaton of Cleveland, Ohio, board chairman of the Chesapeake and Ohio Railway, invited them to his ancestral home in this little Northumberland Strait town.

A group of prominent educationists, writers and industrialists were guests at Mr. Eaton's "Home for Thinkers" here last summer.

The college presidents are members of the Liberal Education Commission of the Association of American Colleges.

F. L. Wormald, assistant to the association's director, said: "The aim of the eight-day session will be to replenish the intellectual reservoirs of commission members so that they may more effectively promote liberal arts education in their own institutions."

The Carnegie Corporation of New York will pay the conference expenses, including traveling costs.

"Discussion of college administrative problems is banned," Mr. Wormald said. "Instead the college presidents will read and discuss together five books likely to stimulate their thinking."

The books are The Meno by Plato, Gulliver's Travels by Jonathan Swift, The Public Philosophy by Walter Lippmann, The Revolt of the Masses by Jose Ortega y Gasset and The Republic and the Person by Gordon K. Chalmers.

Discussion leaders will be President Harold Taylor of Sarah Lawrence College, Bronxville, N.Y., and Dean Jacob Klein of St. John's College, Annapolis, Md.

The conference here grew out of a report to the Association of American Colleges by President R. D. Weigle, its liberal education commission chairman.

He said commission members were "aware of a serious exhaustion of their own individual mental resources."

College presidents felt, he said, that "constant speaking without correlative recreational reading and study has depleted intellectual capital."

Mr. Wormald said "the commission hopes for new understandings from new intellectual resources from its Nova Scotia study conference."

If it is successful the commission hoped to arrange similar programs for both college faculties and students.
