OWING to our farmers being engaged at haying, the market to-day was very small. Prices are unchanged.

AN organized band of highway robbers are spreading terror among the residents of the suburbs of Montreal.

THE Halifax customs receipts for July, 1882, were \$85,166 10, a decrease of \$13,608.95, as compared with July, 1881. The Inland Revenue receipts were \$18,543.16, a gain of \$639.52 over the July of the previous year.

A CORRESPONDENT in Colorado informs us that a young man named Daniel McNeill, belonging to the vicinity of Summerside, has struck a monster silver mine in Sheep Mountain, Colorado. Another young man named Gardner, nephew of C. C. Gardner, Esq., has also struck a rich find.

AN account of a team of horses, whose united ages aggregate fifty-five years, having trotted a mile in three minutes, has been going the rounds of the American papers. One is claimed to be twenty-five and the other thirty years old, and the performance took place at Oxford, Pa. Now, had this been done out West, where the "wind" would have been in their favor, we would not have thought it half so wonderful.

WE are pleased to see that Mr. Harry Sloggett, son of H. Sloggett, Esq., lead at the recent examinations for admission to the Royal Military College of Canada. Twelve young gentlemen have been admitted to that institution, with marks ranging from 3476 to 2197 obligatory, and from 5138 to 1263 voluntary. The fact that Mr. Sloggett has scored the highest number of marks by several hundreds, indicates that he will be a promising military cadet.

INQUEST.—Dr. McLeod, yesterday evening, held an inquest in view of the body of the unknown man found floating on the Hillsborough. The evidence taken was exactly in accord with the account of the finding published in THE EXAMINER yesterday evening. The Coroner's charge to the jury was short. He simply informed them that, from the discoloring of the skin and the swelling of the abdomen, it would appear that the body of the deceased had been in the water at least twelve days, and that it was too much decomposed to effect a full explanation. The jury—of which Professor Caven was foreman—without retiring, returned a verdict "That the deceased came to his death from causes the jurors unknown." The body, up to the present, cannot be identified.

Weather Bulletin.

Probabilities for the next 24 hours for the Maritime Provinces.

TORONTO, Aug. 4—10 a. m. Light to moderate winds, continued fair warm weather.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

The British to the Front.

Uneasiness at Alexandria

Bismarck and DeFreycinet.

LONDON, August 4

The British soldiers were ordered to the front this morning. An attack is momentarily expected.

The Christians at Alexandria are in a great state of excitement, over a rumored threatening of an uprising against that body.

Bismarck has promised to support the Eastern Policy of DeFreycinet, if the latter will resume office.

The British have occupied Suez in full force.

It is reported that Arabi is negotiating with the Porte concerning the joint action of his own troops with those of Turkey against the British forces.

HANLAN TO ROW.

ECCLESIASTICAL.

MONTREAL, Aug. 3.

Hanlan intends to hold a regatta in about three weeks from date, and invites the leading oarsmen in America to join the same, but will not allow Wallace Ross to take part in the regatta.

The New Nova Scotia Government.

HALIFAX, Aug. 4.

The Lieut. Governor was absent from town last evening, consequently the Cabinet arrangements were not completed as expected. To-day everything is in order and the following members have been sworn in:—Pipes, Premier; White, Attorney General; Church, Provincial Secretary; Gayton, Commissioner of Mines and Work; and the other members of the Cabinet are Campbell, Cochrane and Morrison.

GENERAL CABLE NEWS.

LONDON, Aug. 2.

The Times' Berlin despatch states that Spain, Greece and Netherlands will be invited to co-operate in the occupation of the Suez Canal.

The Daily News is informed that the Government possesses evidence of the complicity of the Porte with Arabi, and that documents on the subject may eventually be submitted to Parliament.

ALEXANDRIA, Aug. 2.

The rebel camp moved five miles nearer to us with outposts two miles in advance of the main body. The Arabs are collecting beyond Fort Meks. Therefore it has been determined to occupy the fort on Wednesday.

PARIS, Aug. 2.

Italy will take the initiative in proposing in the Conference the collective occupation of Suez Canal.

It is highly probable that DeFreycinet will resume the premiership. This was seriously talked of at a meeting of senators and deputies last evening.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Aug. 2.

It has been definitely resolved not to send any troops from here or from the Dardanelles to Egypt; but three battalions will leave Salonica on Thursday, twenty-seven ships being prepared for the troops at the arsenal. The total naval force consists of fifteen vessels.

BERLIN, Aug. 2.

The Czar and Sultan exchanged autograph letters dealing with the Egyptian question.

It is stated here that England has proposed that the Turks should take the offensive against Arabi while the British force remains in reserve, thus affording England a guarantee of the Porte's good faith.

ROME, Aug. 2.

It is learned in various quarters that Reccoiti Garibaldi is enrolling volunteers for an expedition to aid Arabi, but the movement is not likely to succeed.

LONDON, Aug. 2.

The Times' Dublin despatch reports that the Ladies Land League is about to be dissolved, and that it is proposed to establish an open organization in which the ladies will not participate.

The Thames Club have refused to accept the challenge of the Hillsdale crew.

The Queen and the Prince.

(From the London Truth.)

The Queen's frequent absence from Windsor, must be a source of considerable profit to the railway companies, as enormous hampers of fruit and vegetables are daily despatched to Balmoral or Osborne (as the case may be) from the Frogmore gardens, and large consignments of cream and butter are forwarded from the royal dairy, all these supplies for the Queen's use being invariably sent from the Windsor establishment. It seems in the highest degree absurd that year after year Windsor Castle should stand empty during Ascot week, while the Prince and Princess of Wales have to bivouac in some neighboring villa, for which frequently a very high rent has to be paid. I am told that the Queen was willing to contemplate "lending" a portion of the castle to the Royal Highness for the week, the preliminary condition being, however, that the list of visitors (not only those who were to stay, but those who were to be asked to dinner, or in the evening) was to be approved by Her Majesty, and there was to be no dancing during the week.
