SOUTH AFRICAN WAR MEDAL.

Returned Canadian soldiers, and
others, no doubt will be interested in
reading the following statement (from
the Daily Telegraph) describing the
South African war medal.

Notwithstanding statements to the
contrary, the ribbon and medal recog-
nizing the services of our troops in
South Africa will be issued to them,
not separately, shortly after the termi-
nation of the war. That is the usual
course, and the War Office has every
intention to follow precedent on the
present occasion. As soon as peace
is declared, an Army Order will be
promulgated, and a month or six weeks
later the coveted award will be ready
for distribution. It is hoped that cir-
cumstances will allow the presentation
to be made by Her Majesty the Queen
at a review of picked men represent-
ing all the regiments that have been
fighting at the front. With regard to
both the ribbon and the medal, most
of the published descriptions are ex-
tremely wide of the mark.

The ribbon which has been chosen
is one inch and a quarter broad, and
divided into five horizontal stripes.
The broadest stripe in the centre is
not khaki colour, as has been stated,
but a rich bright orange, having on
either side a narrow stripe of navy
blue, edging with a wider stripe of
red.

Absolutely erroneous is the an-
nouncement that the medal is in the
form of a five-pointed star, correspond-
ing in size with the Khedival Star of
1882, and having a golden centre, up-
on which is graven a head of the
Sovereign, surrounded by a ring of
bronze, the points of the star being
silver. If such a design was ever in
contemplation it was speedily abandon-
ed by the military authorities, the step
being probably accelerated by the ac-
tion of Sir Redvers Buller, who wrote
home and represented how keenly the
soldiers were disappointed at the pros-
pect of the medal being in the form of
a star. The medal, in fact, will be of
the ordinary character, consisting en-
tirely of silver. On one side a head of
the Queen is graven, but secrecy is
maintained for the present as to the
design on the other side. The draw-
ings, by Mr. de Saulles, of the Royal
Mint, have been approved by the War
Office, and the authorities on Tower-
hill have received instructions to pro-
ceed with the work in all haste.

A despatch from United States Min-
ister Conger intimates that the allied
troops intended to march through the
Imperial palace, situated in the sacred
city of Peking. Like the German
march through Paris, in 1871, this pro-
ceeding does not seem necessary to
the vanquished know they were
beaten. It may have a good effect, all
the same, if it tends to remove from
the official Chinese mind the idea that
the foreign devil does not know how to
return an insult and cannot do it when
he feels inclined.

SOLDIERS, CRITICISM.

There are some signs in the prese
that the return of the soldiers from
South Africa will be followed by an
outflow of criticism of the officers from
Lieut.-Col. Otter down that will be
anything but pleasing. One paper
makes the remark that the personnel
of the corps is such that an intelligent
private will be as readily believed as
an intelligent officer. Already we have
had privates, criticisms of the officers
supported by reported statements
made by privates of the British regiments
as to what they thought of the way
the colonials were treated, and so on.
The circumstances under which the
contingents were organized made it
certain that there would be room for
fault-finding. Many of the officers
were experienced; many of the men
were green. The former did not un-
derstand all their duties; the latter
were not in a position to know when
their officers were acting wisely or
otherwise. The drilling the men re-
ceived, and against which some of
them have complained, was in all like-
hood necessary for their discipline and
instruction for the work they were sent
to do. And so through all the list of
complaint or grievance. The intelli-
gent private may be quite as credit-
able as his officers, but as a rule the
private does not have an officers,
without this knowledge criticism of
officers, conduct is worthless and mis-
chievous, and should be accepted with
a great deal of caution.

It is easy guessing that Lord Rob-
erts will be Lord Wolseley's successor
in the command of the British army.
When it became known that the Duke
of Cambridge was to give up the post
he had held so long, there were many
who thought Lord Roberts the best to
succeed him. He was just home from
India where he won his early fame,
and had more of the characteristics of a
popular hero than Lord Wolseley, who
divided with him the first claim to the
position. Lord Wolseley was selected,
however, and the great army that was
despatched to Africa for this war is
evidence of the capacity of the depart-
ment he is head of. Now that it is his
turn to retire it is natural to look on
Lord Roberts as the man to take his
place. The war now closing has added
to his reputation and left him with-
out a rival.

General Buller seems to have direct-
ed most of the fighting that led to
the Boer evacuation of Machadodo p.
The success of the operations
will generally be the more welcome for
this fact. Sent to Africa in supreme
command General Buller voluntarily
undertook that part of the task which
promised the hardest and most risky
work. He met in consequence with
reverses which in the half panic that
sized the English press were so exag-
gerated that he lost much of the
soldierly reputation he had won else-

where. That he should figure in the
successful fighting of the war's close
may do something to re-establish his
name where it should be.
