SENATOR DEPEW TO MARRY.

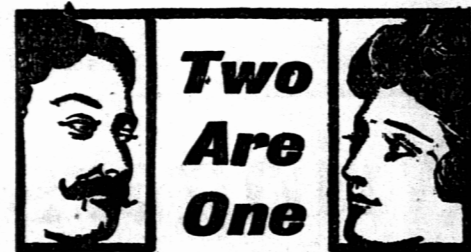
NEW YORK, Oct. 5.—(Special.)—The announcement is made that Senator Dewey will be married shortly to Miss May Palmer.

THE ST. DUNSTAN'S BAZAAR RACING

THE GUARDIAN representative visited St. Dunstan's Bazaar Hall on Saturday last and was shown through the different departments. The Bazaar will be open to the public this evening at 8 o'clock and the panorama then displayed to the eye will be one unexcelled in brilliancy and variety. On entering the Hall the Art Booth artistically decorated in white and yellow blending gracefully with the soft shade of the spruce trimming is the first department that meets the gaze. The ladies of this table have prepared numerous rare works of beauty which speak in no uncertain manner of ability. This Booth is also furnished with a splendid piano which yielding to the gentle touch of the fair ones will furnish "fairy strains of music" to while away the passing hour. On the right of the Hall immediately at the entrance is the cafe department where oysters and ice-cream will be served. This Booth is artistically draped with bunting and flags with cornices of autumn leaves that add to the brilliancy of the effect. Directly opposite at the north western corner is a stand bearing the larger donations to the Bazaar, among them a number of very valuable and useful articles. Alongside this stand is a dainty little stand where clear sparkling soda will slake the thirst of the thirsty. Arrayed on either side of the main hall are the departments for fancy articles, the variety and apron booths, each striving to outdo the other in neatness and beauty of decoration and surmounted by various patriotic emblems. In the centre and dividing the hall into avenues and walks are the Booths for candy and flowers, refresh-

ments and fruit. Each of these is a gem of splendor and form no small feature of the display. The dinner and tea tables are at the further end and under the skillful management of the ladies in charge, form a very substantial addition to the bazaar. A number of gas stoves have been put in and the meals will be served hot at all times. Overhead the Hall is one mass of bunting of various colors neatly arranged and interspersed with the Union Jack and the Stars and Stripes. Great rows of colored electric lights have been strung along the hall and their effect on the bright and varicolored bunting is one of great spectacular beauty. A cloak department has been fitted up and placed in charge of competent young men who will take charge of the coats and cloaks of visitors while seeing the sights and return them when called for. The committee in charge of the music have arranged a neat program for each evening, while not the least attractive part to the sporting visitors will be a noiseless shooting gallery. Those in charge are to be complimented on the grandeur of the preparations and deserve a liberal patronage from a public they have taken so much trouble to please. Indeed we know of no better place to spend the long evenings of the coming week than seeing the sights at St. Dunstan's Bazaar, or a more commendable act than to get your meals there. 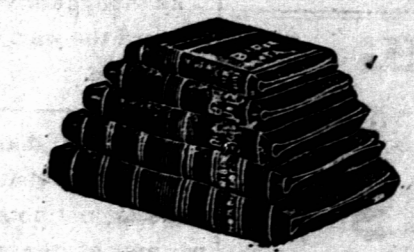
