

Green in Butter Support

LONDON, Ont. (CP) — The support price of butter may drop from the present 64 cents a pound, Federal Agriculture Minister Hamilton indicated Tuesday.

Mr. Hamilton said that "some reduction" in the present butter support price would not only be reasonable but would be in the best interest of dairy farmers.

He said a "closed door national conference" will be held in February to try to find a solution to the "serious dairy problem." He was addressing the annual convention here of the Dairy Farmers of Canada.

Even though there has been a 13 1/2 per cent increase in butter consumption, he said, annual butter production will exceed annual consumption by at least 40,000,000.

"The subsidy is reckoned to cost \$42,000,000 a year based on a 350,000,000 pounds production total."

The purpose of the subsidy, started in 1952, is to stabilize butter consumption, by clipping prices 12 cents a pound below the world market.

QUEBEC DROPS PROVINCIAL

MONTREAL (CP) — A memorandum to newspaper men Tuesday from the Office de la Langue Francaise (French Language Bureau) of the cultural affairs department of Quebec asked their co-operation in eliminating the words "provincial" and "provinciality" with Quebec from current usage.

The memorandum on style, written in French, said "the government of Quebec has decided with reason to eliminate the expression 'Province of Quebec' and, in a general way, the word 'provincial' and its derivatives."

"It is therefore proper that French-Canadian journalists help make prevalent the expressions 'Government of Quebec' and 'State of Quebec' and its derivatives."

Also, they shall try to replace the epithet "provincial" by "... of Quebec." Lastly, they shall remember that the presence of two nations in Canada prohibits the use of "national" to describe the activities and organizations of the central government.

In this case, one must use federal or Canadian.

British Air-Action Sharp De Gaulle Blast

LONDON (Reuters) — British officials Tuesday said President de Gaulle's furious blast over the bombing of Western political and military targets in the wake of his Paris press conference Monday.

The French leader rejected the Anglo-American proposal for a multilateral NATO nuclear force and also turned a cold shoulder to Britain's American-backed bid for membership in the European Common Market.

But Britain was not deterred from pressing its Common Market bid and drew considerable solace from affirmations of support from France's Communist partners — West Germany, Italy, Belgium, The Netherlands and Luxembourg.

A British foreign office spokesman said Britain hoped France would "one day have second thoughts" about de Gaulle's nuclear deterrent.

Most British and European newspapers saw de Gaulle's Paris statement as a crippling blow to Britain's 14-month-long negotiations for Common Market membership.

But their editorial comment came mainly before France's Common Market partners rejected de Gaulle's stand.

LACKS UNDERSTANDING Officials in London said de Gaulle's remarks at his press conference showed "a complete lack of understanding" for the reasons that Britain wanted to

Brazilian Plane Crash Has 13 Dead, Missing

SAO PAULO, Brazil (AP) — A crippled Brazilian airliner with 45 persons aboard crashed into a row of houses near Sao Paulo Tuesday and burst into flames. It was attempting an emergency landing in a steady rain.

Of 40 passengers and five crew members aboard, nine were killed and their bodies recovered. Four other persons on the plane were unaccounted for.

Among the 23 known survivors were Liliana Hernandez, 18, identified as a Canadian, her hometown was not known immediately.

Firemen labored into the night in search of them and possible victims among the residents of Jabaquara, a workers suburb of this southern Brazil industrial center.

The crash of the two-engine, propeller-driven airliner leveled the workers' homes and sent residents fleeing into the streets. They reported a thunderous roar and crash, followed by leaping flames.

Residents and army medical men sped to the scene.

The fifth major Brazilian plane crash since Nov. 26, in the earliest crashes, 175 persons were killed.

The plane, a Convair operated by the domestic Brazilian airline Cruzeiro do Sul, was scaring the end of an economy flight from Rio de Janeiro when it developed engine trouble, airline officials said.

Thawing Pipes Plague British LONDON (Reuters) — British plumbers and firemen worked overtime Tuesday to cope with flooding as warmer weather thawed millions of water pipes which had burst during the 20-day freeze-out.

Hopes of a general thaw were dashed by forecasts of heavy snow and frost in some areas Tuesday night.

Quebec Power Takeover Called Powerful Stimulus To Economy

QUEBEC (CP) — The speech from the throne at the opening of the Quebec legislature Tuesday described the government's program to acquire 11 private power companies as a "powerful instrument" to stimulate the growth of the Quebec economy.

The speech, read by Lieutenant-Governor Paul Comtois, said expropriation will cost consumers no more in electricity rates.

He added that Communists will be used to establish a department of tourism and to set out administrative changes in other government departments.

Boston Woman Lives As Stranger Attacks

BOSTON (AP) — A prominent Back Bay matron was nearly strangled Tuesday before she fought off the intruder with screams and kicks.

Mrs. Andrew D. MacLachlan, president of the Massachusetts State Federation of Music Le-

aders, was attacked in the doorway of her first-floor Beacon Street apartment while her husband slept unaware in a nearby bedroom.

The 66-year-old woman escaped by coming in the ninth woman strangling victim in greater Boston in the last seven months.

Mrs. MacLachlan said she drove the man off with a kick after he had knotted her bathrobe cord around her neck.

"I was fighting for my very existence," she said. "He spun me around so my back was turned so I brought my foot up behind me and gave him a hard kick."

"I must have kicked him very hard," she said, "because he groaned like a pig."

The intended victim is a British-born graduate of London's Central School of Speech and Drama and the New England Conservatory of Music. She is a former singer and music teacher.

BRUSSELS (Reuters) — In the negotiations reaffirmed France's Common Market participation, the Netherlands and Belgium made clear in statements here that de Gaulle was speaking only for France when he told reporters at a Paris press conference Monday the economic systems of Britain and the Common Market were incompatible at present.

The sixth Common Market member, Luxembourg, made no declaration but was known to be strongly sympathetic with the pro-British position of the majority.

The most emphatic pro-British stand was taken by Belgian Foreign Minister Paul-Henri Spaak, a staunch supporter of British Common Market membership throughout the 14 months of off-and-on negotiations between Britain and the six member-countries.

He said flatly the Belgian government did a great deal to de Gaulle and added the problems involved in British entry into the Common Market were no greater than those raised by France in 1956 when the six member-countries were negotiating to set up the European trade group.

Spaak was speaking to reporters before the resumption here of another session of membership negotiations between Britain and the Common Market countries.

The West German delegation stood with the Brussels negotiators at present.
