He is five years old and this season has won \$54,780 with Wendell Wathen doing all the driving.

A couple of days ago the bay filly Barcelona Hanover arrived by truck to James Arling's stable at the Charlottetown Driving Park track. She is owned by Ernest Holdaway of Maine, was No. 321 in the Harrisburg sale catalogue. She is a beautiful bay filly, foaled February 29, 1952, has perfect legs and conformation and is exceptionally well bred. Her sire is Friscoway 3, 1.59 1-5 and her dam Betty Worthy Axworthy 2.04. Her extended breeding is noteworthy, tracing back to the best racing blood in the world and she has twenty-four 1954-56 stake engagements, which will show how highly regarded she is. The filly was bred and consigned by Hanover Shoe Farms, Hanover, Pa.
