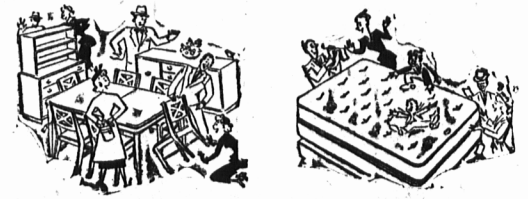

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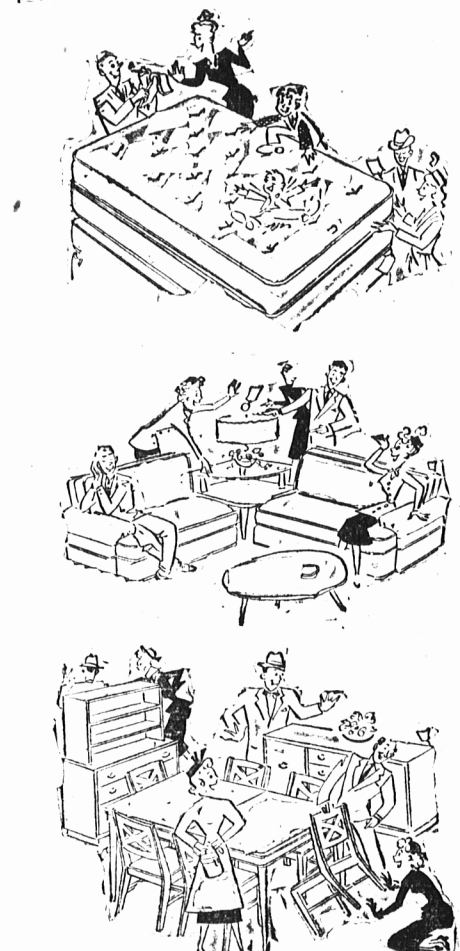

Says Brother Not Involved in Visa Business

WINDSOR, Ont., Aug. 24 — (CP) — Mrs. Nicholas Steigerwald said Friday in a statement that her brother, Health Minister Martin, had nothing to do with her business activities, which have been reported to include helping Canadian emigrants to the United States.

In her signed statement released through her lawyer, Lawrence A. Deziel, she said:

"Certain press releases made in connection with an investigation being conducted by United States authorities into alleged irregularities in the documentation of Canadian emigrants entering that country, have referred to me as the sister of Hon. Paul Martin, Canadian minister of National Health and Welfare.

"This reference would suggest that he has assisted, advised or aided me in the conduct of my business dealings, or that he approved of them; such suggestion is entirely contrary to fact. . . any suggestion that I have conducted my business affairs on the strength of his good name or influence, is preposterous and is without any foundation in fact. I sincerely regret that present circumstances have caused my brother undeserved and embarrassing notoriety which might have been avoided if I had accepted earlier advice to me."
