Discussions were held regarding the matter of raising funds and the chairman of the ways and means committee, Jerry Doucette, stated that it was planned to hold a mammoth bingo in the near future. All the members present stated their willingness to help the project in every way possible.

The matter of the new pay set up was dealt with by Councillor Herber; Schurman, who outlined for the benefit of the members of the brigade the details of the present arrangements and suggested that the secretary, Mr. G. W. Hogg, should write to the council and an official ruling on the subject. It exists.

Royals, 8-7, in Bathurst, and were given to believe that the team was really not very strong, but when they appeared in Summerside, and trounced the Royals 9-2, we received a far different impression of them than we had anticipated. We talked to some Summerside ball fans after the game here, and they considered that both Royals and Bathurst were below par as intermediate provincial champions. We're not sure we can agree. Both teams played Sunday under adverse weather conditions, which naturally made some of the defensive plays look a bit sloppy, but we feel that this Bathurst team is much stronger than they were rated. The two pitchers that showed here had blazing speed, and the Royals whom we always considered a hard-hitting outfit, were held to two hits. We saw only one well-tagged ball from the Royals bats, and that was a drive to left field by Jimmy Grady that went straight into the glove of the left fielder who took it without moving out of his tracks.

We'll be looking forward to hearing how the Bathurst-Bear River series turns out. If Bathurst makes a good showing, it looks as if they are at least average provincial championship material. It would be stretching coincidence too far to have below-
