# W.V. De Coste Dies At Age 66

William V. (Bill) DeCoste of 46 Bayfield Street died late yesterday afternoon.

Mr. DeCoste was born in Charlottetown in 1899 and was a well known and well-thought-of employee of the Charlottetown Post Office until his retirement last year.

Mr. DeCoste attended public school in Charlottetown and upon graduation he joined the Army and in the First World War went overseas as a reinforcement for the Second Seige Battery. He was a member of the occupation army in Cologne, Germany, following the war. He was awarded a number of decorations for his overseas service.

When he returned from overseas Mr. DeCoste attended business school and afterwards he joined the postal service.

In the interval between World War One and World War Two, DeCoste was Regimental Sergeant Major of the old Prince Edward Island Highlanders.

Surviving are: his wife, the former Pearl Vessey; three sons, William Jr. and Ralph, both living in Vancouver and Vincent in Boston, Mass.; two daughters, Theresa at home and Pearl, Mrs. Kenneth Pope, Kitchener, Ont. and one brother, Fred, of Charlottetown.

## Maritime Electric Co. To Install New 20,000 Kilowatt Generator

A new 20,000 kilowatt turbo-generator unit will be installed by Maritime Electric Company in its Charlottetown plant. It has been learned from Hon. Lloyd MacPhail, minister of industry and natural resources.

The generator was deemed necessary by Maritime Electric because of increased demand for electric power and consumer usage.

Robert Smith, company manager, said the unit would handle Prince Edward Island's requirements until 1972 or 1973 when it is expected the causeway will provide an avenue for additional power.

The new installation here will bring the total capacity to 70,000 kilowatts. Previous additions to the plant resulted in increases of 10,000 kw in 1959 and 20,000 in 1963 at a total cost of about \$4,900,000.

**TARGET 1968**

Mr. Smith stated Maritime Engineering is the consultant firm on the new project and work is expected to start next summer with a completion target date in 1968.

During the past few years studies have been carried out on the feasibility of installing a submarine cable between New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island. However, the recent announcement of the construction of the causeway in the next few years has led to the decision to proceed with the installation of a submarine cable. It is now probable that a suitable cable will be installed on the causeway and this will provide a link with the mainland utilities.

The cable on the causeway is considered to be a more reliable means of bringing power to the Island than the submarine cable which would be subject to possible ice damage as well as damage during construction of the causeway. In addition, a substantial saving in costs should be made over the installation of a submarine cable.

Officials of the local utility estimate that the new installation will provide adequate firm power until 1972 or 1973, depending on the load growth during the next few years. This should allow ample time for the completion of the causeway with a power cable attached.

Mr. MacPhail said that the decision to enlarge the generating facilities locally was made after receiving advice from J. Kaye of Engineering Service Company, Halifax, who had been engaged to study the situation following a meeting held in Charlottetown last June with representatives of the mainland utilities. Mr. Kaye has advised that the local generating capacity should be enlarged and the link with the mainland deferred until a more reliable and more economical connection can be made on the causeway.
