The Princess was during the marriage ceremony a golden diadem set with rubies, which is said to have been the property of Solomon.

CAPT. HOWGATE, formerly Chief of the United States Signal Service Bureau, who has been in jail some time awaiting trial on a charge of swindling the government out of \$50,000, was granted leave to go to his home to visit his daughter, a few days ago. He went in the company of a detective. On reaching home he said he wanted to "go up stairs for a moment." He went, and has not been seen since.

ENGLISH GOSSIPERS, after having made a dozen or more "scoches" for the Princess Beatrice, all of which have fallen through, have just arranged another. This time the name of the Earl of Fife is published as the future bridegroom. He is 33 years of age, handsome, clever, agreeable, and a descendant of the Macduff in accordance with Shakespeare. Beatrice is just twenty-five.

NOTICE TO MARINERS.—Notice is given that, from and after the opening of navigation this year, the light established last year upon the most westerly point of St. Peter's Island, in Hillsborough Bay, on the west side of the entrance to Charlottetown harbor, Prince Edward Island, will show a fixed red, instead of a fixed white light, as heretofore. The change has been made to prevent confusion with Blockhouse Point and Point Prim lights. Lat 46° 7' 10" N, lon 63° 11' 40" W.

MR. JOHNSON, of Halifax, points out one particular in which the Opposition have grossly falsified the alleged outgo of people. He says that people leaving Prince Edward Island, for instance, were first counted on leaving the Island, and counted again on leaving Halifax. The same thing probably occurred in regard to the Cape Breton exodus, though in a less degree. Also the passengers by the English steamers, who took steamer again at Halifax for Portland and Boston, were counted as Nova Scotia emigrants.—Mail.

NEARLY a fatal accident occurred in the Railway yard this morning. A woman, named Ann Storey, in the employ of the Railway, while crossing the track with two buckets of water, saw the train approaching. Not having time to get off the track, she stood by the platform, which is about five feet high, and in connection with the freight house. The engine passed her, but the box cars, being wider than the engine, jammed the poor woman against the platform. Dr. Conroy, being called, found she had three of her ribs, and collar bone, broken. She was taken to her home as her injuries attended to, and is now doing as well as can be expected.

ONE of the best points made by Mr. Fred. Peters was that, as he had attended closely to his own business so it was to be presumed that he would all at once and for nothing become an earnest worker in the cause of the public. There may be some force in this, though we have seldom seen a selfish, self-absorbed man become all at once a benefactor of his kind, and we would much rather place confidence in such a man as Mr. Blake, who, while attending carefully to his own business and prospering in it, has yet found time to take a foremost part in movements tending to the public weal.

BEAUCHAMP BAGENAL was the keenest sportsman in County Carlow, if not in Ireland, in his day, and a large landowner to boot. He supplied Charles Lever with a hero for his "Knight of Gwynne," and wrote with several pages in his "English in Ireland." His descendant, Beauchamp Bagenal, is still recognized as the crack authority on things sporting in that county, whether it be fox-hunting, grouse-shooting, or salmon-fishing. Whilst his brother, Philip Bagenal, has just been sent to America to investigate the position of the Irish in that country, he intends shortly, I believe, to favor the public with the results of these investigations across the Atlantic in a volume entitled the "American Irish."—London World, 6th.

RICHARDSON, TEXAS, April 20. Brown Pierce, a farmer, to-day found his wife hanging from a door-knob, and his three children lying dead on the floor side by side. The supposition is that Mrs. Pierce strangled the children and hanged herself.

SEDALIA, Mo., April 21. Two more deaths are reported by the Brownville tornado, making a total of eleven. Others are reported fatally injured.

PERKSKILL, N. Y., April 21. Four laborers on the West Shore Railway were drowned, by the capsizing of a boat, while attempting to cross the river.

BOSTON, April 22. John Crookshanks King, the sculptor, died at the Massachusetts General Hospital to-night, from affections incident to old age. He has two sons in St. Louis.

LONDON, April 21. A serious riot occurred at Ruabon, Wales, owing to a strike of colliers. The rioters had done great damage to property. The militia have been sent to quell the disturbances.

A battalion of Connaught rangers now on the way from Natal will disembark in Ireland. A battery of horse artillery embarked for Ireland on Thursday. These additions will bring up the force in Ireland to seven regiments of cavalry, twelve batteries of artillery, three companies of engineers, and thirty two battalions of infantry.
