THE Daily Sentinel of Prince Arthur's Landing has been enlarged to sixteen columns. SIR ALLAN YOUNG has chartered a steamer to search for the Leigh Smith Arctic expedition. THE "Kitty Clyde" has arrived at Caneo from Barbadoes, with a cargo of molasses for Horace Haszard, Esq. MR. S. R. J. KINGS has returned from Philadelphia, where he has been a student of the Medical University. JAMES H. FLETCHER, Esq., has arrived safely in Colorado, and has been welcomed by the journals of that place. FRESH Halibut received to-day, at the Fish Market, Grafton Street. MAY 4 11 AN order-in-Council has been issued prohibiting the killing of whales by the use of explosive instruments. THE Commissioner of streets, with his accustomed energy, is having the principal streets of the city well cleared up. THE Stockholders of the Bank of P. E. Island met to-day. After a short discussion the meeting was adjourned for two weeks. HON. T. W. DODD, Mrs. Dodd and Miss K. Davies have left the island for a trip to England. They sail from Halifax by the "Sarmation." D. I. K. RINEZ, well known in Canada as a somewhat eccentric, but at one time popular temporary lecturer, is now a raving maniac in the dungeon of an insane asylum at Wayne, Mich. MESSRS. TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

Release of Irish Leaders. Great Rejoicing in Ireland! Forster's Vacant Seat. Opinion in England. JEWS ON THE MOVE.

Special Dispatch to the Examiner. LONDON, May 3. Parnell, Dillon and O'Kelly were released at 11 o'clock last night. The Right Hon. Joseph Chamberlain, President of the Board of Trade, or the Right Hon. George Shaw Lefevre, Commissioner of Works and Buildings, will probably succeed Mr. Foster. The Times says the policy now to be tried in Ireland is one of concession and conciliation, pure and simple. There were spontaneous rejoicings throughout Ireland on the release of the Leaders. At Limerick many people danced with joy, shouting "Forster is gone," "God save Ireland." Bands turned out at Waterford. Fires were blazing on Wicklow Hills last night. Justin McCarthy presided at a special meeting of the Irish Parliamentary Party here yesterday, when Bernard Molloy offered a motion thanking the Canadian Parliament for adopting the resolution in favor of autonomy for Ireland. Sir Joseph McKenna seconded the motion and it passed. In the House of Lords, last night, Lord Granville said the Government had no new policy to announce in regard to Ireland; but, he added, that the Coercion Act would not be renewed. He announced that the vic-members of Parliament would be released at once, and the cases of the other suspects would be reconsidered with a view to their release. But this consideration would not be extended to the case of Michael Davitt. Sir Stafford Northcote likened the Government to a pendulum swinging from one side to the other. John Nelson Darby the religious writer is dead, aged 82. LAMBERG, May 3. The number of Jewish refugees arriving there is constantly increasing. Polish Jews are pronounced in favor of emigration to Palestine. SANTA FE, May 3. Mexican troops, yesterday, under the command of Col. Garcia, met the Indians. Col. Forsyth is pursuing and killed 78, taking 33 prisoners.

Political Meeting at Rustico. GREAT TRIUMPH FOR THE GOVERNMENT CANDIDATES—FALGOUTHERSON THINKS THE GOVERNMENT TOO ECONOMICAL. A meeting of upward of 400 electors was held in Rustico, on Wednesday, the 26th inst., for the purpose of nominating candidates to contest the coming election. After appointing Mr. Ephraim Gallant as Chairman, and the undersigned Secretary, D. McKay, M. P. P., addressed the meeting. Having thanked the electors for the great support he had always received from this part of the District, he said that he had supported the Sullivan Administration for the past, and would in future if it practices economy. He pointed to the great saving that had been made, and the country was not suffering by its retrenchments. He further stated that if elected he would do all in his power to lessen the expenditure of the Legislative Council. D. FARQUHARSON, M. P. P., supported the policy of the Opposition; he said the government wanted to be too economical; and that the country was enduring it very heavily. He made allusion to some benefits that would be gained if a Chemical Lecturer was appointed to go into the Country and Lecture on the best method of farming. He was not in favor of abolishing the Legislative Council. He charged the Government for supporting unworthy officers, to which D. McKay bravely replied. ALEX. C. SHAW, Esq., spoke in favor of the Government, particularly in the great economy practiced by the administration. He also stated that the public wants had been liberally attended to in his part of the District. RICHARD WISE, Esq., endeavored to disapprove of the Sullivan administration, but did it very unsatisfactorily to the audience. Messrs. Byrne, of Charlottetown; Laird, of New Glasgow; D. Gallant, E. Dickson, T. Doyle and others, addressed the meeting and gave very fair remarks. The following nominations were made: D. McKay, M. P. P., proposed by Joseph Duron. Alex. C. Shaw, Esq., proposed by James Power, seconded by T. Bourke. D. Farquharson, M. P. P., proposed by W. Laird, seconded by C. Dickson. Richard Wise, Esq., proposed by Ch. Dickson, seconded by J. Col. On division, McKay and Shaw received almost a unanimous support. Three cheers for the Government candidates, and the meeting dispersed quietly. EPHRAIM GALLANT, Secretary. Rustico, April 23, '82.

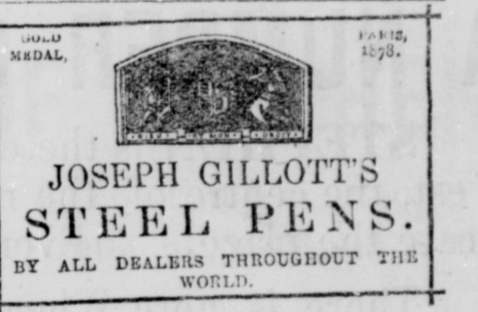
