AGRICULTURAL STATISTICS.

THE SIAMESE SITUATION.

That Siam has been villainously treated by France is evident to everyone. Siam has been forced to pay a heavy indemnity and to yield a portion of territory to which France had no right.

Thanks to Lord Rosebery and the Marquis of Dufferin, the interests of Great Britain have been maintained with dignity, and war has been avoided even though a Liberal Ministry is in power.

The London Daily News says: "It would be folly to deny that our relations with France have been severely strained. Much credit for the fortunate outcome of affairs is due to the consummate diplomacy of Lord Dufferin."

The Chicago Tribune has discovered that the Italian, Arata, who was lynched at Denver last week, was an American citizen, and therefore there will be no case made over the affair by any foreign government.

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The run of salmon this year on the Fraser River, B. C. is ahead of all previous years. A revival in the price of cattle in England is gratifying, not only as a relief to shippers who have had a most unfortunate season, but because the increase will stimulate the British people to demand the removal of the embargo on Canadian animals.

The Government has been advised that President Cleveland has issued his proclamation declaring in operation the Act of Congress providing for reciprocity in wreathing, and as the Canadian Act was proclaimed two months ago the arrangement is now effective.

SPREAD OF THE CHOLERA.

It is Epidemic in Naples and on the Increase in Russia. Despite the denials that have been made to the presence of cholera in Naples and the information that appeared to sustain the denials, the London Central News publishes the following figures as to the number of cases of the disease and deaths in that city:

From July 20 to July 28 there were 292 cholera cases registered in the city and 17 deaths. The daily average was 37 cases and 2.1 deaths.

On July 22 there were 45 fresh cases and 24 deaths reported. The number of cases and deaths has declined since then.

The Italian Government still suppresses concern of the cholera in Naples. Their action is no longer successful. The truth is known despite municipal co-operation in denying the facts.

Official returns that have just been issued show a marked increase in the ravages of cholera in the parts of the Russian Empire where the disease is epidemic.

The figures show that from July 16 to July 22 there were in the government at Padolia, 1,165 cases and 250 deaths, as against 499 cases and 122 deaths during the week preceding.

In the government of Orel, from July 16 to July 22 there were 234 cases and 91 deaths, as against 148 cases and 52 deaths during the previous week.

In the government of Tula there were 77 cases and 19 deaths from July 16 to July 22. In the preceding week there were only 31 cases and 8 deaths.

In Moscow, from July 16 to July 22, there were 72 cases and 21 deaths. The epidemic exists, though in less severe form, in the governments of Viatka, Kazan, Riazan, Oufa and Simbirsk.
