New floors have been laid in the hockey dressing rooms and several improvements made.

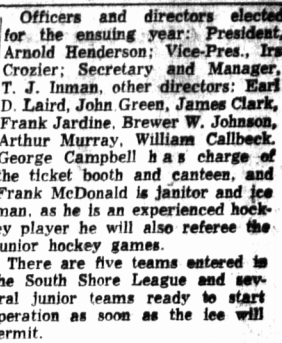
