## MARKETS.

### FLOUR.

A Galt, Ont., circular, of the 1st inst., states that the grain crops have improved much of late, and they now present a more favorable appearance, with every prospect of a fine quality, but poor yield. Influenced by this, the rise in prices has been checked, and markets are firm and steady. Flour is steady, the late advance being firmly maintained and the demand is active. In Galt, Spring Extra is quoted at from \$5.20 to \$5.25; Extra, from \$5.50 to 5.55; Superior Extra from 5.60 to 5.65. The Montreal Gazette of the 4th reports that nothing was done in breadstuffs on that market beyond the sales of a few lots of flour; Superior Extra selling at \$5.95, and Spring Extra at \$5.75. ### POTATOES.

Boston advices of the 2nd inst., state that old potatoes are about out of that market, and no regular prices can be given, although a few will be wanted for a week or two longer. Prices range from 50 to 90 cents. The Montreal Gazette of the 4th states: "The advance in the price of old potatoes at the beginning of the week had the effect of bringing in larger supplies to-day, which had to be sold at a considerable reduction, sales being reported of good Early Rose and Chili at 80 to 90 cents per bag. New potatoes were also in much better supply, and prices were materially lower; choice Early Rose from Lapraire selling at \$1.50 per bushel. There were several lots of small potatoes which it seemed a pity to dig, that sold for lower prices, but they were by far the dearest."

### OATS.

The English oat market was, at latest advices very dull, and 13s. 3d. is only obtainable at present. France is not buying, and the quotations above are for the United Kingdom. Sellers are holding out for 19s. 6., but they will have to give way.

### EGGS.

There has been a fair demand for eggs in Boston during the week, with very little variation in prices. Canadian fresh stock is quoted at 16 to 16½ cents and Prince Edward Island eggs the same.

### COMMERCIAL NOTES.

From Montreal Gazette, 4th inst.  
BAR IRON.—Cable advices just received report an advance in the price of bar iron in England of 2s 6d per ton.  
HIDES.—Advices from Liverpool quote the hide market strong, and numerous enquiries have been received in Boston and New York from the other side.

WHEAT CROP.—Despatches from Springfield, Illinois, state that the Secretary of the Board of Agriculture estimates the wheat crop of 1881 in that State at about one-half the crop of 1880.

SOLE LEATHER.—There is a good export demand for buffalo sole leather, one dealer in Boston having, it is said, sold no less than 30,000 sides on cable orders during the past few days for Liverpool.

WOOL.—The firm feeling previously noticed in wool continues, and we have sales to report of 200 bales of greasy Cape chiefly at 10½c, a few bales being taken at 13c. We notice a sale of 60,000 lbs. of Cape wool in Boston on Canadian account, but the terms were not made public.

PETROLEUM.—BRADFORD, Pa., June 30.—Crude oil active and irregular; sales, 442,000 bbls. United Pipe Line certificates opened, offered at 77½c, advanced to 78½c, broke and closed at 77c. Oil, CRRY, Pa., June 30.—Crude oil active. United Pipe Line certificates opened and closed at 77½c.

IRISH WRONGS AND THEIR REMEDY.—In a letter to the Daily News, Mr. John G. Richardson, of Beesbrook, says: "I would change the licensing laws, so as to put an end to the fearful drinking habits of the people, which are at the bottom of the poverty of the country. Just imagine in this year of famine nearly £10,000,000 consumed in spirituous liquors in Ireland by people who say they cannot pay their rents and debts, most having been consumed in those localities popularly known as the poorest."
