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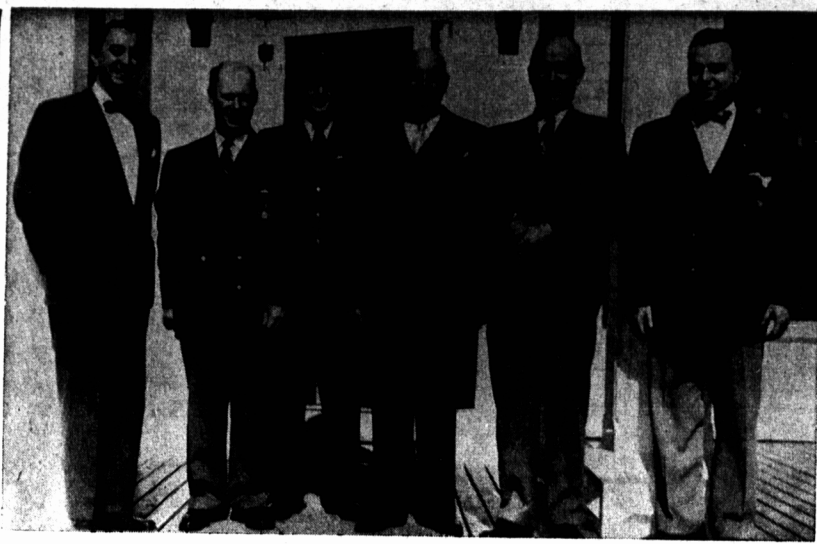

but tense Friday. Anti-aircraft guns were mounted at strategic spots in the Plaza de Mayo, while trucks loaded with ammunition stood by.

The government made no mention of casualties. But the capital was not entirely free of violence. A policeman was shot to death early in the day in the Belgrano district by unknown assassins.

The state radio identified Brig. Gen. Dalmiro Videla Balaguer as chief of the rebel forces. He was accused nine days ago of leading the Cuatro garrison in north central Argentina, 350 miles west of Buenos Aires.

The uprisings flared at Cordoba, the big provincial capital in central Argentina; in Entre Rios province north of Buenos Aires and at Coruzo-Quatia, about 325 miles north of Buenos Aires.

At Cordoba a group in the air force technical school rebelled. Troops of the 3rd Infantry regiment launched a dawn attack against them.

Cordoba is a strong centre of Roman Catholicism. The campaign which Peron launched vigorously against the church prior to the June 16 revolt met with marked resistance there.

Execution Of Wilbert Coffin Is Postponed

QUEBEC (CP)—Execution of Wilbert Coffin, convicted of killing an American bear hunter in Gaspé peninsula was postponed Friday to Oct. 21.

Meanwhile in Ottawa, Coffin's counsel said he will attempt Oct. 4 to carry an appeal to the Supreme Court of Canada.

The lawyer, Francois Gravelle, filed a written notice Friday to have the court hear a motion for leave to appeal. The full court will consider the application Oct. 4.

Recently Mr. Justice Douglas Abbot rejected a similar motion. If an appeal hearing is refused, the 43-year-old prospector's only hope of escaping execution would

be intervention by the crown. The stay of execution was granted here by Mr. Justice Oscar Boulanger. The hanging, scheduled for Sept. 23, was postponed to permit hearing of the application to Canada's highest court.

Coffin was convicted last year in Perce, Que., for the shooting in 1953 of Richard Lindsey, 17, of Hollidaysburg, Pa. The bodies of Richard's father, Eugene Lindsey, 47, and a friend, Albert Clair, 20, both of Hollidaysburg, were found nearby.

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President Of Engineering Institute Speaker Here

Mr. R. E. Hertz, president of the Canadian Engineering Institute was the guest speaker at a dinner of the Prince Edward Island branch of the Engineering Institute held last evening.

Mr. Hertz dealt with the problem of securing a sufficient number of qualified engineers, at the same time pointing out the important role that engineering is playing in the national economy of Canada.

"More advanced training is necessary" said the speaker. "Industry is constantly on the lookout for young men of ability, thoroughly grounded in the fundamentals and capable of advancing positions of responsibility."

Continuing, Mr. Hertz said "with a great need for more highly qualified engineers and with the possibility of those seeking a college education doubling in number during the next decade, the challenge is a formidable one for the universities. The colleges are well aware of the situation and have been striving for years, with considerable success to improve engineering education in the face of many discouraging difficulties."

Mr. Hertz said that the universities could not be expected to carry on this task without financial and moral support. He urged members to think more about the universities and to increase contributions substantially and convince others to do likewise. He stressed the fact that business and industry are fully aware of their dependence on well trained college graduates "and it is reasonable to expect that their support will be proportional to the increasing demands of the future," he said. "Governments,"

said Mr. Hertz, "are likewise appreciative of the serious plight of our universities of higher learning and will doubtless continue to study it to determine future policy."

In conclusion, Mr. Hertz said, "The engineer and the scientist have accomplished much, but they face a future that will challenge them beyond their wildest imagination. They are a team and must remain so if they are to meet and conquer the monumental responsibility to society. Will they be equal to these responsibilities? Of course they will, but only if we who have the future in our hands today give them leadership they will require."

Mr. Norman Stewart presided at the dinner which was attended by engineers from Moncton, Amherst, Halifax, St. John's and other parts of the Atlantic Provinces. The speaker was introduced by Mr. Gordon Milligan and thanked at the conclusion of his address by Mr. E. S. Chandler.

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Souris Board Of Trade Considers Federal Bldg. Site, Telephone, Train

A special meeting of the Souris Board of Trade was held in the Town Hall last evening. Mr. Ray A. Laird, president, occupied the chair in the absence of Mr. Mervin MacDonald. Mr. Innes acted as secretary for the evening.

First question for the meeting was the new Federal Building for Souris. Considerable discussion took place re a site for the new building. It was recommended by Paul Gallant, seconded by Edmund Lavie, that the Board of Trade recommend to the Department of Public Works that the present Post Office building be retained and that an appropriate site in the town be purchased for the new building.

Taking part in this part of the discussion were Mr. T. J. Kichham, M. P., Mr. Stewart, Mr. William Hughes, Mr. Paul Gallant, Mr. Sterns.

Question two referred to the telephone service in Souris. On recommendation of the meeting, the secretary was instructed to write to the Island Telephone Company and send a copy of the letter to the Board of Public Utilities showing that the present telephone system is inadequate.

Question three curtailing of train service in King's County. The first speaker, Mr. Paul Gallant, pointed out from a business point of view how it would effect establishments in this province area and he suggested three trains a week instead of the two. Mr. Gallant was just back from a three-day meeting in Fredericton, N. B., and seemed to be very well versed on the railway situation in the Maritimes. Taking part in the railway discussion were Mr. Sterns, Mr. Wright, Mr. Kichham. The Board of Trade is making a recommendation to the railways that in the event of the third train not being granted they would like to have Friday's freight train stop over night and depart on Saturday morning. The reason for this request was based upon the large amount of shipments of perishable products from Souris. The committee will wait upon the superintendent of the Island division of the railway. The committee includes Mr. Gallant, Mr. Stewart, Mr. Kichham and a produce dealer yet to be appointed.

Life Underwriters National President Addresses Meeting

Mr. C. W. Mealing, C.L.U. of Toronto, Ont. president of the Life Underwriters Association of Canada, addressed a special luncheon meeting yesterday at noon at the Charlottetown Hotel.

Mr. R. J. Rupert, C.L.U. Regional Vice President for New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island was chairman and LeRoy Gallant of Summerside, Provincial Vice-President introduced the speaker.

Mr. Mealing pointed out that, in life insurance selling today, the emphasis is placed on high standards of technical knowledge and training coupled with a sincere desire on the part of the life underwriter to serve the best interests of his clients.

As president of this national organization, Mr. Mealing heads more than 7,500 life insurance representatives in 73 local associations across Canada. The Life Underwriters Association, founded in 1906, is largely responsible for today's high standard of ethics existing among Canadian life insurance underwriters.

Mr. Rupert said that the Association's aims are to promote good business ethics and to help give its members the knowledge necessary to render professional insurance counsel through educational meetings such as the one held today, university extension courses

resulting in the granting of the title "C.L.U." (Chartered Life Underwriter) and various publications.

MR. MEALING'S ADDRESS
"In the 34 years I have been in the life insurance business," said C. W. Mealing, "Many changes have taken place. My subject was 'Selling Life Insurance—Yesterday—Today and Tomorrow'."

He said, "In those early years, a life insurance man's kit of tools consisted of a rate book, a bunch of pamphlets, a pocket full of applications and a fountain pen."

"There were no aptitude indexes, no vocational interest guides, and very little formalized company or institutional training. There were no Agents' contracts, and many other things we now recognize as standard equipment were, perhaps, not even in the drawing-board stage."

Mr. Mealing pointed out that these conditions have changed tremendously. The emphasis today is on high standards, professional training for life underwriters with the interests of clients and quality service given paramount importance. "Though many new needs and uses for life insurance have developed since these early beginnings," he said, "The basic purpose of life insurance has not changed down through the years. To provide for family needs, such as food, clothing and shelter. New needs, however," he pointed out, "are the product of an advancing civilization."

SOCIAL LEGISLATION
Mr. Mealing said that in the future, more social legislation could be expected. He remarked that, not so many years ago, social legislation such as workmen's compensation, mothers' allowances, family allowances, and old age security were nonexistent. These, he said, did not hurt our business but rather pointed up the fact that government was recognizing old age, for example, as a hazard.

He went on to say, "I would not be unduly disturbed about those things which, at first appearance, would seem to affect our business adversely. If they are in the best interests of the public," he said, "they will thrive. If they are not in the public interest, they have within themselves the seeds of their own destruction, and they will soon cease to be problems."

Mr. Edwin Johnstone, C.L.U. brought the greetings of the City Council to the distinguished speaker and also thanked him on behalf of the meeting.
