Dedication of the Church of Scotland.

According to announcement the Presbyterian Church, (Kirk) situated at St. Anthony's cemetery, Highfield, was open for public worship on the 4th inst. The day was all that could be desired, and when the Rev. John Goodwill took his stand at the desk the church was filled to overflowing. The first song of praise that ascended to the Lord God of Hosts from the congregation was the 100th Psalm:

"All people that on earth do dwell,
Sing to the Lord with cheerful voice," &c.

Rev. Mr. Goodwill preached an able and interesting sermon from Isaiah, 66th chap., 2nd verse. In the afternoon not more than one-half the people could gain admittance into the church and while many stood at the windows to hear the discourse, many turned away when they saw the place so crowded. Rev. D. McLean, the pastor of the congregation, preached from Jeremiah 7th chapter 2nd verse. At the evening service Rev. Joseph Parkins preached to a crowded house from the words "Behold he prayeth," Acts 9-11. He gave a very practical and interesting discourse, and had the undivided attention of the large congregation from the beginning to the end.

The congregation is to be congratulated upon the completion of such a handsome church. It has not been erected to gratify the lust of the eye, being plain in design, yet it is a very pretty and substantial building. The congregation as a whole, seems to be in a flourishing condition, as this is the third new church that has been erected within its bounds during the last four years; also one repaired. The one just completed was only commenced in the early part of the summer, but a willing people, with an active and energetic committee can do marvellous things in a short time. Mr. Charles Boyver, foreman; Mr. Neil Stewart, Mr. D. Carr, Mr. Lawson and Mr. Neil MacKinnon were the carpenters, and all have shown by their workmanship on this building that they are experienced men. The work is neatly done, and the acoustic properties are good. The arched ceiling is finished in ash and walnut, and reflects great credit upon the designer. The tapering spire is surmounted by a large Scotch Thistle, a fitting emblem for the Church of Scotland. Three rows of pews--the two outside rows being curved--were made by the well-known firm of M. Wright & Co. The finishing touches were given by the well-known painter, Mr. Corney. He is always ready to take a con-

Would Run Prince Edward Island If He Had the Chance.

"DEAR SIR,--I see by THE EXAMINER that Solomon Slow has left the country; it is a pity, because he hit some pretty hard knocks.

By your paper of the 12th inst., I see you advocate calling a convention to nominate men for the fight against the present administration. It would be well to force the present government to get ready their accounts up to and including November 30th, and let the electors have a statement to that date, showing debt in full, amounts due banks and loan companies, taxes collected for the year ending Dec. 31st, 1899, amounts due banks at that date, amounts of Liquor Regulation Act fines levied and collected, cost of repairs to Provincial Building, amount of outstanding floating bills, amount of road orders paid to that date, and in fact a proper business and financial statement of the whole outfit to the end of the present month. If they start now there are three weeks to prepare the information and the electors will then have about two weeks to think it over.

I, for one, would think it only about fair that the people should know how things stand before they are asked to vote Mr. Farquharson and his government another lease of power. Now is the time to get the information and if they (the government) don't give it honestly it will be their fault.

The only information the people have, so far, is what the opposition dragged from the government at last session of the House, and that was very meagre and did not include matters for the months of January and later. A very important item would be (and they should be separate) amount of road orders paid up to June 30th, and amounts paid from July 1st to November 30th, both dates included. Should we get this I think it would a tale unfold. I ask you, Mr. Editor, to push for this information and sign myself

SIR CHARLES TUPPER.

Commenting upon the retirement of Sir Charles Tupper the Montreal Star says: "A life of almost incredible activity, connected as it has been with all the great measures and important movements in this country, left him with still apparently unimpaired vigour. A man of twenty-five might have been proud of the intellectual activity and physical endurance the grand old leader showed in the campaign just closed."

It is to the verdict of time all must appeal for justice, but it is not given to many to have that verdict rendered till the sod has thickened on a forgotten grave. The advancing greatness of the Dominion, which sprung from the union of the colonies, the vastness and wealth of the territory which the building of the Canadian Pacific Railway opened up; the fiscal policy under which Canada has prospered and which even his political opponents have tacitly adopted go to make a testimonial to Sir Charles Tupper during his life-time greater than any shaft of stone that could be erected here after.

"He retires from active public life full of years, honors, and with the proud satisfaction of having seen his policy on every great public question proved right. His graceful adieu to his old friends and to the country he has loved and labored for is regretted, but he has earned, as few other men ever did, the right to spend his remaining years in the peace and quietness of domestic life. He takes with him the best wishes, the kindest feelings, the most cordial sentiment of the whole Conservative party, and we feel sure of many outside its ranks who recognize the noble work of a great man's life."

ITALIANS CAPTURE CHINESE.

LONDON, Nov. 12.--A special despatch from Tien Tsin, dated November 7, says a detachment of Italian troops returning to Pekin intercepted three battalions of Chinese near Kunahsien. The latter surrendered without firing a shot.

THE PROHIBITION VOTE.

In the course of a recent interview with the Winnipeg correspondent of the Toronto Globe, Mr. Hugh John Macdonald was asked, "What about the prohibition vote?" "I am sorry to say," he replied, "that judging from this election, what is commonly called the prohibition vote is a myth. I am afraid that the men who talk prohibition are first Liberals or Conservatives, then after that prohibitionists. The result has proved that there is no such thing as a purely prohibition vote. I believe the result also means a setback for prohibition from which it will not recover within the next twenty years. Politicians are only human, we only learn by experience, and they are so human that my experience will teach them not to sacrifice themselves for the sake of a party which deserts them at the polls. The liquor men know where they stand, and no liquor man will sacrifice his interests simply because it is his party which is doing it. The trouble is the prohibitionists vote with their political party, and the liquor men, both Conservative and Liberal, vote and work against the party which favors prohibition. In the future the prohibitionists may thank themselves if neither of the great political parties consent to take up their cause." Mr. Macdonald expressed his intention of resuming law practice, and says he will not re-enter local politics."
