

Leaves Next Month To Continue Music Studies In France



Mr. William K. Rogers, of Charlottetown, (above), already a noted young Canadian musician with a master's degree in piano and composition from the Juilliard School of Music in New York, is sailing for France on June 19th where he will continue his musical studies. Mr. Rogers will take a two-month course at the School of Music at Fontainebleau, near Paris. Among the instructors at the school, which is under the patronage of the French Government and enrolls North American students for the purpose of fostering good relations between France, and the United States and Canada, is Robert Casadesu, renowned musician who has played with most of the world's famous orchestras under whom Mr. Rogers will study piano. He will also study under Mile. Nadia Boulanger, world famous teacher of composition, whose pupils have included such well known musicians as Stravinsky. Directors of the school, which celebrated its 30th anniversary last year, have included Dr. Damrosch, Francis Casadesu, Charles Widor, famous organist, and Maurice Ravel, composer. Mile. Boulanger is the present director of the school. One of the special courses given there last year was a series of lectures in interpretation and technique given by the world famous English pianist, Clifford Curzon. To obtain his master's degree, Mr. Rogers studied at the Juilliard School for seven years, of which the last three were on a Juilliard fellowship. While there he sang with the Robert Shaw Collegiate Chorus for several years and studied choral conducting under Robert Shaw. Since his graduation, he has spent two years as teacher at the Hamilton Conservatory of Music, of which the director is the well known Canadian pianist, Reginald Goudeau. Mr. Rogers is best known as a composer, and a number of his compositions, have been heard on the trans-Canada network of the C. B. C., among them a string quartet performed by the Solway Quartet and "Three Songs by Emily Dickinson", performed by the Leslie Bell Singers. The string quartet has also been broadcast to Europe and South America. Last fall Mr. Rogers organized and directed the Charlottetown Chorus, a group of young Charlottetown singers, which has been tremendously popular in its few appearances before the public, and completed most successfully in the P. E. I. Musical Festival this month. Besides attending the summer course at Fontainebleau during July and August, Mr. Rogers plans to visit other parts of Europe before returning to Charlottetown.
