TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

[SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER.] DOMINION PARLIAMENT. The Orange Bill. OTTAWA, April 9. At the request of the promoters the discussion on the Orange Bill has been postponed for a week. Treasonable Societies. Senator Campbell yesterday introduced a Bill for the punishment of persons connected with Secret Treasonable Societies. A Refusal. The Government have refused the request of the American distillers to export whiskey into Canada in bond for re-export to the United States. Phoenix Park Murder. DUBLIN, April 10. A true bill has been found against Joe Brady for the murder of Lord Cavendish and Mr. Burke. The other prisoners pleaded not guilty. Punishment for Carrying Explosives. LONDON, April 10. The Government bill providing punishment of persons convicted of having explosives on the person, passed a third reading yesterday in the House of Commons. Blown Up. DUBLIN, April 10. The Sheriff's house in Talbot was blown up yesterday. Another Arrest. LONDON, April 10. Another arrest of a party connected with the dynamite plot was made yesterday. Telegraph Notes. Louis Vanilott, the celebrated French author and journalist is dead. Dynamite fears have reached Paris and owners of large establishments are stopping openings to cellars, as was done in the time of the Commune. A destructive fire occurred at the village of Vallorbe, in the Canton of Vaud, Austria, on the 7th inst. One hundred cottages were burned. Loss 1,500,000 francs. No lives lost. The London Observer, of the 7th, says that the police possess knowledge which may lead to further developments in what is likely to become the most hideous and stupendous plot of modern times. The committee appointed by the National Rifle Association to arrange the details of the match with American teams, met in London, on the 7th, and arranged for the election of the British team. The trial of Nihilists began on Monday. The Crown will invoke the extreme penalty of the law against six prisoners. The trial of twenty-six other Nihilists will begin on Saturday next, at Odessa. In response to his letter denouncing the dynamite outrages, A. M. Sullivan, late member of Parliament for Meath, received a personal warning from O'Donovan Rossa to be careful about his future utterances. The statement that arrangements have been completed in the trial of the prisoners concerned in the Phoenix Park murders is confirmed. Joe Brady will be tried first. The crown lawyers have determined to resist any postponement of trial. Mr. Clifford Lloyd, magistrate, accompanied by a strong force of police, made a raid in Crumlin district, Ireland, on the 7th, and arrested eight young men charged with conspiracy to murder. More arrests on the same charge it is expected will be made. An hotel at Greenville, Texas, fell and burned on the 7th. Fifteen bodies have been buried in the ruins. Thirteen persons were killed by the falling buildings or burned to death in the ruins. One man cut his throat when he found the flames were consuming him and some fifteen persons were more or less injured, some fatal. La Chronique states that the police have searched the house of a Frenchman who fled from Brussels after the dynamite explosion at Gansborten on the 23rd of February last, and have found a number of cipher letters, some of them from Cyrot one of the men arrested at the time of the explosion, which contains proof of a plot against the Czar. In Birmingham a man known as Flaherty who has been under police surveillance as a suspicious character, has openly expressed sympathy with Whitehead. In consequence of these expressions, an angry mob on the 7th made an attack on his residence, smashing windows and doors. Flaherty succeeded in making his escape and fled to the police station for protection. About a grain of dynamite, which was found among Whitehead's stock of destructive substances, was exploded to-day as an experiment. The report was deafening. The London Times says the London police are convinced that former trifling outrages which have been committed in London, by an attempt to blow up the Mansion House were undertaken by an Irish resident in London, who was investigated by persons in America. It is stated that the police of Birmingham now have certain evidence that Whitehead and the persons arrested in London were implicated in the recent outrages in London. They claim to be able to show that Whitehead for many years has been one of the principal financiers in England. It is expected he will be tried in London with the other prisoners. A banquet was given by the corporation of Civil Engineers at Kensington, Eng., on the 6th inst., and James Russell Lowell, United States Minister, who was among the guests, in reply to the toast, "Our Visit," said: "A more important function of diplomacy is to maintain good humor between the nations."

Mr. Lowell's remarks were received with cheers. On Saturday, Tracy Gould, an American lawyer, applied at the Bow Street police court London, for permission to see Gallagher. The magistrate on duty referred Gould to the Visiting Justices. Bernard Gallagher, who is in custody at Glasgow, is a moulder by trade. A person residing close to the Milltown prison has received letters in which the writer threatens to blow up two large gasometers near the prison with dynamite. Two large jars of nitro-glycerine have reached Cork from Glasgow addressed to Oherlihy. The police have discovered a quantity of explosives freshly buried in a field at Katnap near Cork. Two carboys of nitro glycerine have been lying at the Clyde Shipping Co.'s stores in London, since the 4th inst. They are consigned by Glasgow firm to Oherlihy.
