THIS MORNING, at an early hour, one of our dry goods' merchants entered his store on Queen Street, and, on looking in the usual manner, to see if all things were as he left them on the previous evening, he was struck with astonishment to find that an enormous amount of goods were missing. His excitement became boundless; and, impressed with the idea that his premises had been burglarized, proceeded with all haste to the residence of the City Marshal and aroused him from his peaceful slumbers. He informed him that his store had been entered from the rear, and that twelve coats, as many pairs of pants, several webs of cloth, lenders, drawers unaccountable, had been taken. The Marshal examined the premises. No marks of the burglar were visible, save the missing goods. A cellar-hatch in the rear was examined. It was not fastened, and it was evident that the burglar effected his entrance through the hatch. Policemen were immediately detailed to seek for the stolen property. All suspicious houses and localities were searched; but the search for the stolen goods appeared vain and unsuccessful. The search was diligently prosecuted until nine o'clock, at which time the merchant arrived at the Police Station and informed the officers of a startling clue, as follows: "That his clerk, on the previous evening, was preparing to receive new goods, and he placed all the missing property in a secret apartment, without making him (the merchant) aware of the fact." Thus ended the champion fizzle.

QUEBEC ELECTION.

The Good News Confirmed!

A Decisive Blow to the Lieutenant Governor who Dismissed his Ministers.

Dominion Elections - Conservatives Active and Confident!!

Special Despatch to Daily Examiner.

MONTREAL, May 7-7 p. m.

The House stands - thirty-four Conservatives to thirty-one Liberals.

All the Conservatives stand pledged to unqualified opposition to the Joly Government.

The first motion in the House will be one of condemnation of the Lieutenant Governor's dismissal of his Ministers.

The House is called for business on June 4th.

The Dominion House is expected to prorogue on Friday.

The Dominion Elections will likely come on at once.

Conservatives are actively organizing throughout the Province, and are determined to carry Quebec by a large majority. We enter the fight with confidence.

Corruption was general on the part of the Liberals in the late election.

THE WAR.

Special Despatch to Examiner.

LONDON, May 7.

The statements that General Todleben is negotiating with the British Admiral Hornby and the Porte, and that he has sent an ultimatum to the Porte, &c., are contradicted.

Pending negotiations between St. Petersburg and London, Todleben is not likely to adopt any course tending to create new complications.

Admiral Hornby, after spending three days with Minister Layard, returned to Ismailia yesterday.

His personal opinion is that he feels the fleet should not withdraw beyond Gallipoli.

The most important army corps in front of Constantinople is commanded by Baker Pasha, an Englishman.

Captain Manthorp, an Englishman, who is second in command of the Turkish fleet, has just received a decoration from the Sultan.

The statement that Admiral Hornby's fleet is expected at Port Said is obviously premature.

A despatch from Constantinople says that Gen. Todleben is about to retire to the lines of Tshataldja, leaving a small force at San Stefano.

The Russians offer to fall back behind a straight line drawn between Dedagatch and Adrianople, if the British fleet will withdraw at the same time.

NEW YORK, May 8.

A London special states that a basis of the arrangement which the Powers desired to submit to the Czar has, at last, been agreed upon, and if the terms of this arrangement are accepted by Russia, war will be virtually at an end.

BELCADE, May 7.

The Ministerial difference have culminated in the resignation of the Minister of War. It is probable that there will be extensive modifications in the Ministry.

It is now confidentially stated that Servia will not join Russia in case of a new war.

FOUND off Cheposto - about two miles east of Souris - a MAIN-SAIL with a pitch pine boom, oak grained. The boom is 60 feet long, and is twenty-three inches at the jaws. Also, quite a lot of rigging and blocks. It is thought that the hull is not far off - a shirt was wrapped around the gaff. The mainsail had a single reef. The whole stuff is to be sold on May 24th, if not claimed before.
