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Fisheries Enforcement Officers Active In P. E. I. Lobster Areas

The Federal Department of Fisheries are intensifying their efforts this year in an all out drive to stop the practice of catching and processing of undersized lobsters on Prince Edward Island.

Fishery regulations are being rigidly enforced including the seizure of hundreds of pounds of legal sized lobsters found untermized with illegal (undersized) lobsters. Wardens are stationed at all wharves and landing places in Western Prince County and a number of special enforcement officers, reportedly from the mainland, are continuously patrolling the area.

These men are reported to be well trained and equipped with walkie talkie radio, and other equipment and as one fisherman said "they are everywhere". Up to the present three trucks, two from the Tignish area and one from Kings County, are under seizure and a large number of fishermen have appeared in court under the fishery regulations and many cases are pending.

Elect Trial By Judge And Jury

—Two Summerside men, Clarence Cahill and Cyril Arsenault, elected trial by judge and jury when they appeared before Judge L. G. Lewis in judges criminal court in Summerside yesterday.

Following their hearing in Police court at Summerside last week the two were committed for trial in Supreme Court on a charge of robbing with violence in connection with an incident which occurred two weeks ago when a Miscouche man was allegedly beaten and robbed of a sum of money.

Unless another election of trial is permitted the case will be heard at the November sitting of the Supreme Court.

Doctors Stress Opposition To Fee-splitting

VANCOUVER (CP)—Canada's medical profession Tuesday underlined its opposition to fee-splitting by branding the practice "unethical and possibly dishonest."

On the second day of the five-day 87th annual CMA convention, the association's general council gave unanimous approval to a report from the committee of ethics opposing fee splitting—an arrangement between two doctors in which one receives part of a fee paid to the other without the knowledge of the patient.

Association president Dr. C. W. Burns of Winnipeg said there was no evidence of widespread practice of fee splitting in Canada but added: "We are not immune."

Both Dr. Burns and Dr. Arthur Dill Kelly of Toronto, newly appointed CMA general secretary, said it was almost impossible to determine the exact extent of the practice since doctors involved kept the arrangements secret. But both emphasized they believed the "number of doctors involved was extremely small."

In other business, the council named Dr. T. Clarence Routley of Toronto as CMA president-elect and gave official recognition to chiropody as a profession ancillary to the medical profession.

Also adopted was a report from the committee on nutrition giving aluminum cooking utensils a clean bill of health.

The reports were made public by the committee chairman following day-long closed meetings of the annual council—parliament of Canadian Medicine. First general association sessions open to the 1,500 delegates start today.

Showdown Looms In Guatemala

TEGUCIGALPA, Honduras (AP)—An exiled resistance leader declared here Tuesday he will return "very shortly" to Guatemala, where an imminent showdown seemed in prospect between the army and the leftist government of President Jacobo Arbenz Guzman.

Private advices from Guatemala's capital said 80 army officers had handed a questionnaire to Arbenz regarding Communist influences in the country and demanded a satisfactory reply by the end of this week. This threw a somewhat different light on developments in tense, censorship-blanketed Guatemala than reports reaching Washington Monday night. The earlier reports said the army had given Arbenz an ultimatum to break with the Reds by today or resign.
