Court Cases At Souris Wednesday

At Magistrate's court at Souris Magistrate Gilbert A. Gaudet, a resident of Annapdale was fined \$5.00 and costs or five days for operating a motor vehicle improperly equipped. A resident of Souris was also fined \$5.00 and costs for operating a motor vehicle without brakes.

For being intoxicated in a public place, a resident of Nova Scotia was fined \$20.00 and costs or thirty days. One of the trio was convicted under the excise act and was fined \$100.00 and costs or three months.

New Technique Reported For Grafting Skin After Burns

By ALTON BLAKESLEE SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — Two surgeons Tuesday reported a grafting technique by which one square inch of borrowed skin can be made to cover 10 square inches of burns.

A split-thickness of healthy skin is mixed with salt solution, then whirled in a kitchen blender for 10 minutes. The skin separates into clumps of 10 to 100 cells, and the liquid looks like buttermilk.

This mixture then is sprayed or poured onto gauze, to remove the salt water, and the gauze is inverted and placed over the denuded area. When the gauze is removed two weeks later, islets of skin have started growing. Within another week the whole area is covered with new skin.

A person with burns covering half his body could still easily supply enough skin to form his own grafts. Five per cent of his unburned skin would do the job. Extensive burns are often fatal unless covered.

The technique was described to the American College of Surgeons by Drs. John S. Najarian and Horace J. McCorkle of the University of California.

So far it has been applied successfully only to rabbits. Human trials are planned soon, Dr. Najarian said.

13 Tax Cases Heard In Souris

Eighty-six charges were laid last week against workmen contravening a town of Souris by-law by failing to obtain the workman's license for working within the town.

Twenty of these cases were called before Magistrate Gilbert A. Gaudet, and of these eleven were fined \$10.00 and \$3.00 costs or ten days; seven were stood over for one week; and two were without warrants. The court ordered that warrants be issued if the offenders did not appear in court.

Employers have been advised that the names of all male employees and their wage rate must be submitted to the town clerk. The Souris workman's license rate varies according to wages from \$7.50 to \$15. annually.
