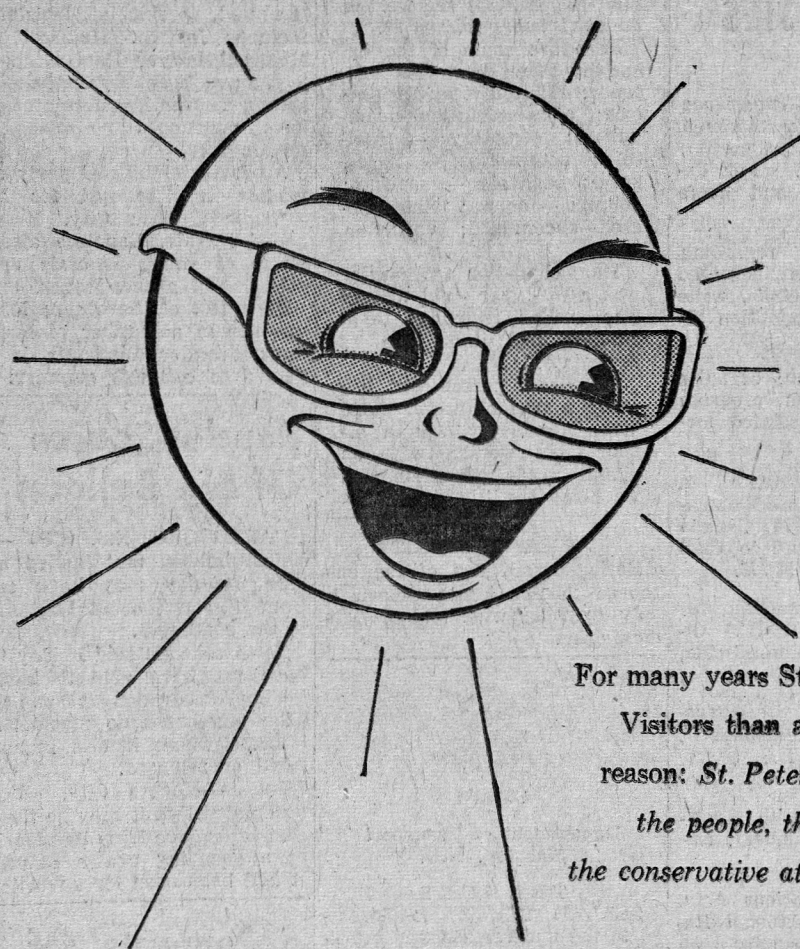
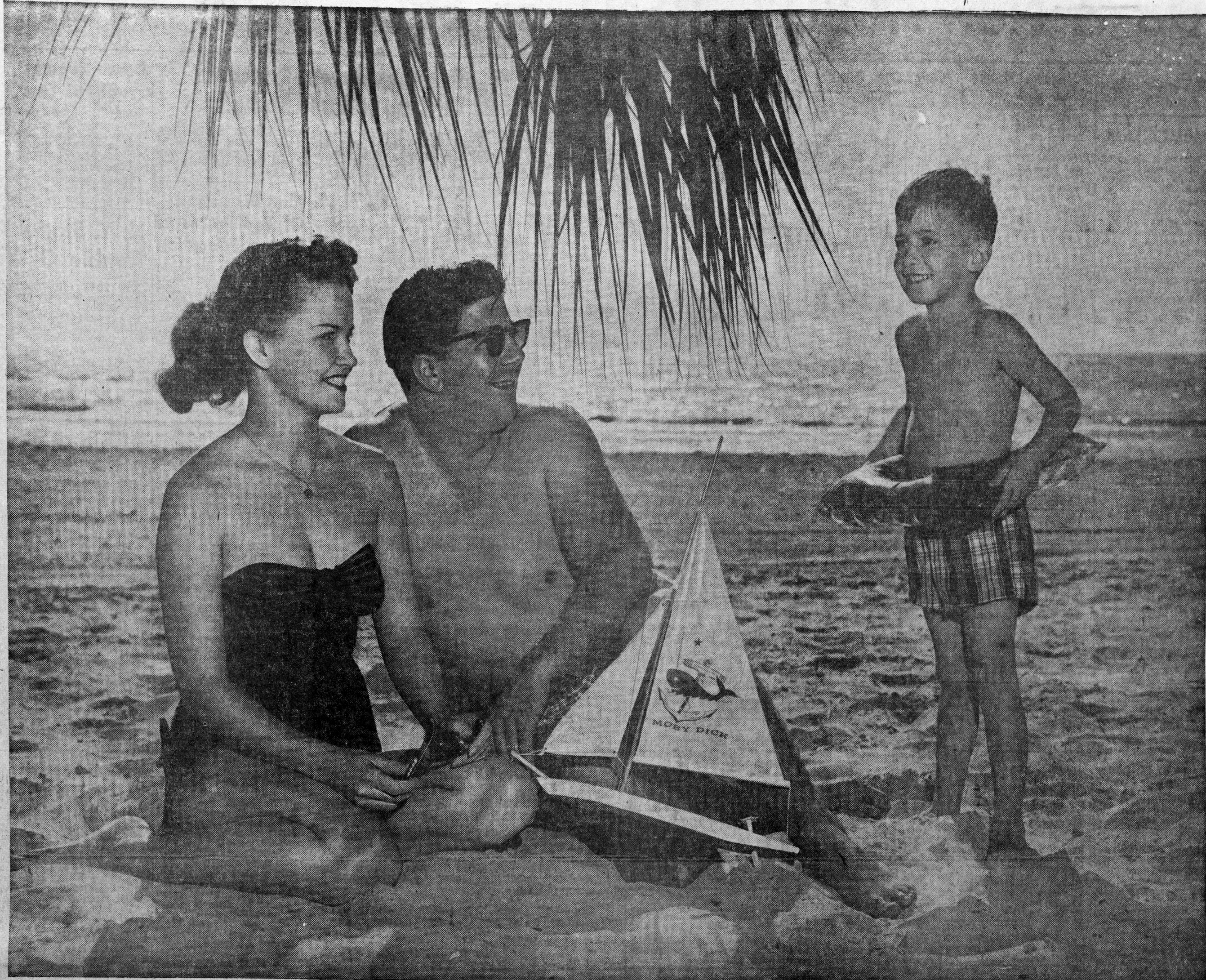
Mr. James MacLean had recovered sufficiently to return to his home in Little Sands. C.O.

Forest Fire Warning Given

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld. (CP)—The department of mines and resources has issued a forest fire warning—the earliest on record.

To date this year two fires have broken out in this province that could be classed as forest fires, the department said. Usually at this time of year the ground is covered with snow and there is no forest fire danger until June.

A report from Corner Brook on the west coast Friday said Fire Chief Gordon Brewer was "a worried man." Since the last trace of snow disappeared a few weeks ago his brigade has put out 28 grass fires. Three of them were termed "dangerous."



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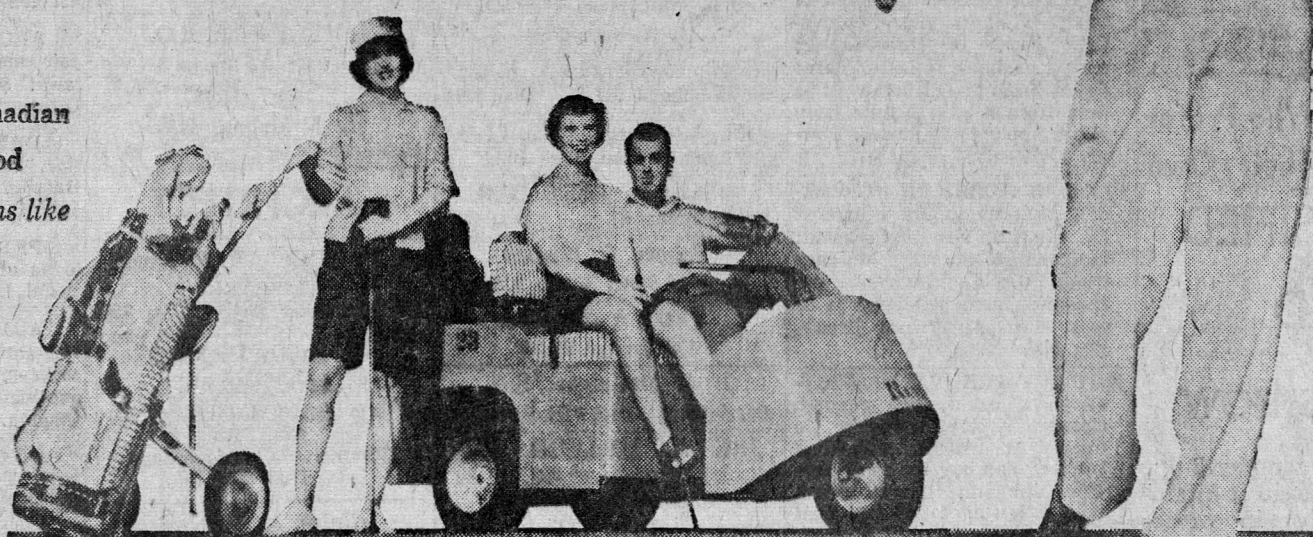
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
