BISMARCK loves to swim by moonlight.
 THE price of pig-iron is rapidly advancing.

 THE *M. A. Star* sailed for Halifax yesterday with a varied cargo, and five passengers.
 THE New York *Herald* expects to see a large emigration from England to the United States.

At the Stipendiary Magistrate's Court this forenoon John Flynn was fined \$3 or fourteen days for being drunk and incapable, and G. Smith, for the same offence, was fined \$1 and costs or four days.

WM. M. SMITH, Esq., Steamboat Inspector for the Lower Provinces, has been presented with a gold ring and congratulatory address by the steamboat engineers of Pictou. Mr. Smith made a suitable reply to the address.

MESRS. DAWSON AND LEPAPE to-day exhibited in their stand in the market an extraordinarily large cauliflower and a broccoli. The first weighed six and a quarter pounds, and the second something over five and a half. This is something remarkable, when it is known that the average weight of cauliflowers is three pounds.

WE observe by the advertisement of the Exhibition Secretary for Queen's County that no live stock will be entered for competition after Friday, the 3rd day of October. The object of this rule, doubtless, is to give the Commissioners time to prepare pens, stands etc before the day of the Cattle Show. Farmers should take care not to forget this rule.

"POTATOES are said to be in demand in England at high prices," writes a correspondent, "but the quotations given in the papers do not go to show it. They are quoted in St. John's market, Liverpool, at from 4s. to 7s. per cwt. If these are the correct figures, shippers who are now hurrying forward supplies will find it an unprofitable speculation."

THERE is great excitement at the Appraiser's Office Water street. The street in front of the office is full of cases and packages, ex. *Prince Edward*. Merchants' clerks are crowding about the venerable Appraiser, who temper must be put to a severe test. The office—which contains only about half a dozen cases at most—is so packed that one or two seemingly inexperienced officers have no room to move.

"GOOD TIMES"—The *Mail* says:—"The thought that must at this time be uppermost in the Opposition mind is, that there is such a fatal coincidence between Liberal Conservative rule and good times, and between Reform rule and depression. THE attendance at the Market to-day was large. Sales—particularly of fruit—were brisk. Prices as follows: Beef (small) from 5 to 12 cents per lb.; beef (qr.) from 4 to 8 cents; mutton, from 4 to 10 cents per lb.; lamb, from 5 to 9 cents per lb.; chickens, per pair, from 30 to 45 cents; Geese, from 40 to 50 cts.; ducks, 20 to 25 cents per pair; butter (fresh) from 14 to 17 cents per lb.; butter (tab) from 13 to 14 cents; eggs from 12 to 16 cents; plums from 8 to 10 cents; apples per bush. 4 sets to \$1.00; potatoes, 25 cts.

MESRS. HORNE, PIERCE & Co. received from the Factory of Walter A. Wood, M. & R. M. Co., of Hoosac Falls, N. Y., two self-binders and harvesters. These binders have been brought to the Island to experiment on as they are something different from what have hitherto been manufactured. These binders bind with twine instead of wire—as the other machines. Farmers think it an improvement over the wire. The machines will be at work at Souris and St. Peter's Bay for a week or ten days or as long as they can find grain to cut. Mr. Walter A. Wood, the President, and Mr. J. M. Rosebrooks, the Superintendent of the Company, are now on the Island with the machines. They intend to have the third on by the next Boston Boat; something of a different principle so they will be able to test which is the best to build for another year's sale. Our farmers would do well to see these machines at work. Over ten thousand of them now in use. EXTRAORDINARY YIELD.—A few days ago we were shown an excellent sample of California wheat, grown by Wm. McDonald, of Pamure Island. 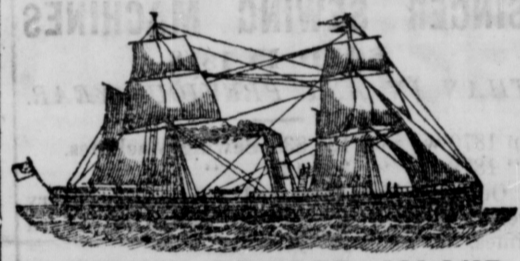
