ADDITIONAL PARTICULARS. Pacaud the Intermediary. OTTAWA, Aug. 21. In the Senate Railway Committee, the investigation of the Mercier-Pacaud scandal was continued. The evidence given that twenty-five thousand francs were remitted to Mercier out of the amount received from the Dominion Government on subsidy accounts, proved also that \$8,900 of the steel was paid to Madam Fry on account of the purchase of Pacaud's house.

INTERNATIONAL COURTESIES.

The French Squadron at Portsmouth. A Royal Reception. PORTSMOUTH, Aug. 21. The French squadron met with a magnificent reception at Portsmouth yesterday morning. The Admiral and seventeen officers landed and were conveyed in royal carriages to Osborne Place, where they were received by Queen Victoria, the Duke of Connaught, and Princesses Louise and Beatrice and a number of nobles attached to the court.

DOMINION PARLIAMENT

House of Commons. OTTAWA, Aug. 20. In the House of Commons yesterday the Sergeant-at-arms reported that he could not find Thomas McGreevy in Quebec. Mr. Cochrane has denied the charges against him, which have been referred to a special committee. Upon motion to go into committee of supply, Amyot moved an amendment censuring the Government regarding the contract for Kingston Dock.

CIVIL SERVICE ENQUIRY.

Premier Abbott's Announcement. OTTAWA, Aug. 21. In the Senate yesterday Premier Abbott announced that it was the intention of the Government to appoint a royal commission to enquire into the working of the civil service, and recommend a more complete system, whereby affairs shall be managed in a business-like way. He also said that the Government intend appointing an inspector to supervise operations in every department.
