A MOUNTAIN SLIDE recently struck a California railway train on which Thomas Martin, a Queen's Co., N. B., boy is engineer, and James Gayton, of Woodstock, N. B., conductor. The engine and one box car were carried 150 yards, but no one was hurt.

THE Allan Line steamer Newfoundland, Capt. Mylius, and steamer Linn o' Dee, Capt. Millar, both outward bound, collided in Halifax harbor on the 24th ult. The Linn o' Dee, which was about sailing for Boston, had just backed out of Pielon's dock, and was about two lengths distant from the wharf, when the Newfoundland, steaming down the harbor, struck her heavily almost fairly amidships. The people standing on the neighboring wharves could hear the great crash as the two ships came together, but, owing to the darkness, could not discern the extent of the damage. Both steamers proceeded to sea immediately, without communicating with the shore.

A YOUNG SQUAW, about fifteen years of age, and her child, died at Canning, N. S., the other day, under very sad circumstances. The girl and her two little brothers went to Canning about a year ago, built a hut of sods and poles and eked out a miserable existence for some time. The hut was burned one stormy night, and residents of the place built housekeeping. The girl recently gave birth to what is described as the smallest living child ever seen, and was in a state of absolute poverty. In her deserted condition she died of hemorrhage of the lungs, and the child died a few hours afterwards.

BRITISH NEWS.

The Situation in England.

Hartington and Parnell.

LONDON, Jan. 31.

The Duke of Westminster has retracted his recent charge against the Parnellites of squandering Irish donations in debauchery. He says he is unable positively to prove the charges.

The News believes that Lord Hartington will remain neutral, and not ask to trammel Gladstone in his efforts to settle the Irish question. With the exception of Lord Hartington, it says, Gladstone will not find a serious defection among his former colleagues.

The suggestion that Parnell be given a place in the Cabinet cannot be acted upon as he could enter the Cabinet only on the basis of the bringing in of a bill granting complete legislative independence to Ireland.

LONDON, Jan. 31.

At the League meeting to-day, the Mayor announced that the executive had instructed him to discontinue boycotting.

The press association states on authority that Lord Hartington will not join the new cabinet.

A Princess Ill

LONDON, Jan. 31.

Princess Beatrice, bride of Prince Henry of Battenberg, is ill, and the Queen has arranged to have her and her husband reside for the present at Windsor Castle.

Land Frauds in the States.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 31.

Richard Dament, Surveyor-General of Utah, reached Washington last Thursday, and was yesterday and the night before closeted with Commissioner Sparks at the Land Office, and also had long interviews with Secretary Lamar. Dament is showing up most astounding frauds committed during ten years past, and involving many public men.

Greece and England.

LONDON, Jan. 31.

The Official Journal of Athens denies that the attitude of the Greek cabinet has changed. Lord Salisbury has instructed Admiral Hay, the commander of the English Mediterranean squadron, to employ force against the Greeks whenever they attack the Turks.

About 11 o'clock last night the schooner Sophie Krank, Capt. Smith, from Perthamboy, for Portland with coal, went ashore on Nigger Head, and will probably be a total wreck. Crew saved.

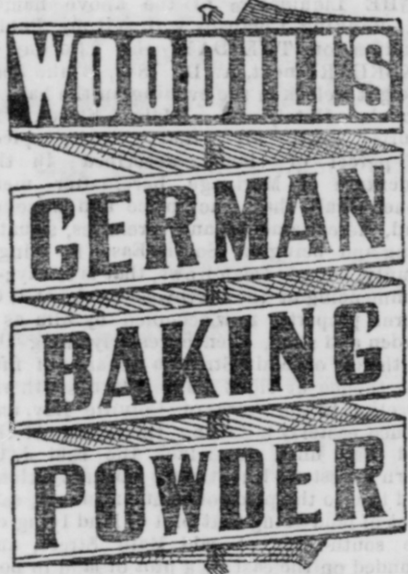
