Central Presbytery
Y. P. U. Spring Rally

—The Spring Rally of the Cen-
tral Presbytery Y. P. U. was held
in Malpeque United Church, Sun-
day, June 4th. Two sessions met,
afternoon and evening. The nice-
ly arranged programme was in
charge of the president of Central
Presbytery, Keith Moase, Ken-
nington Y. P. U. A large represen-
tation from many Unions were
present. Words of welcome were
extended to the group by Rev.
James Cross, pastor in Malpeque.
Opening devotions were led by
Margate Union.

A formal address was heard
from Rev. H. E. D. Ashford, Char-

these groups besides Biblical study,
worship, there is always the
finest fellowship for the young
and nearly every meeting has
some form of recreation. However
O'Leary does need a place where
the young can play ping-pong, bas-
ketball, etc. We are informed that
when the O'Leary Legion hauls up
its new Legion Memorial Home,
space will be provided for these
healthful recreations and sports.
It is also hoped to have a curling
rink established. These are
certainly steps in the right direc-
tion and it is sincerely hoped that
these tentative plans all material-
ize.
