

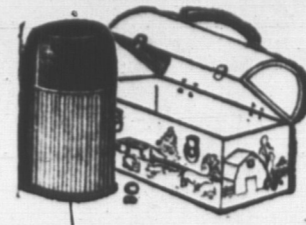

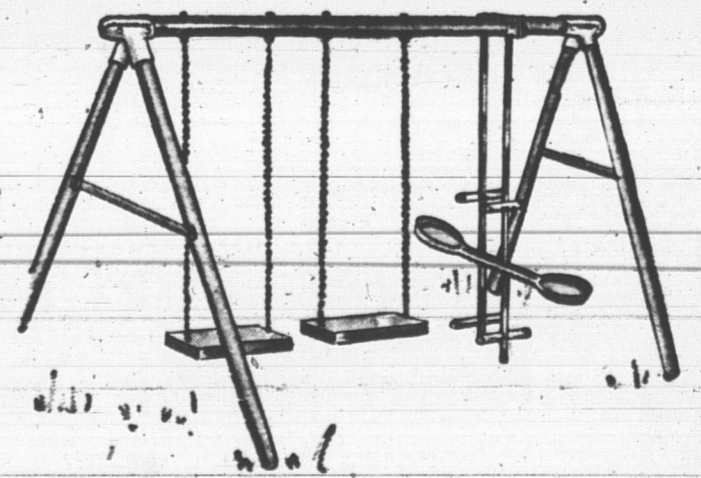

## Woman Is Convicted On Liquor Sale Charge

A \$200 and costs fine or three months in jail was handed down to Muriel Cameron of 230 King Street yesterday in city police court.

The accused, appearing before Magistrate A. J. Haslam, Q.C., was convicted of selling liquor.

Crown evidence was given by Sgt. Keith Wakelin of the Charlottetown Police Department who said he and Sgt. Lloyd Wakelin were parked near the accused's residence and saw Lee G. Irving, 224 King Street, enter 230 King and return with a bottle of wine in a brown paper bag.

Mrs. Cameron, upon seeing the police, said to Mr. Irving "Cops! run," said the sergeant, who added we caught the accused at the corner of the house.

Mr. Irving said he purchased a quart of wine for \$2 and was picked up by the police and taken to jail.

Sergeant Ready, who had the contents of the bottle analyzed said it was 17.4 percent proof.

The accused was represented by Gordon Tweedy.

## Man Fined For Creating Disturbance

SUMMERSIDE A Misconche resident, Paul Ernest Gaudet, who entered a plea of guilty at a previous hearing, was fined \$25 and costs by Magistrate W. Chester S. MacDonald in Prince County Court yesterday on a charge of creating a disturbance in or near a public place.

The charge arose following a disturbance at the Wellington Centre hall which saw the accused ejected. After being ejected from the hall Gaudet is reported to have thrown bottles at cars and smashed two windows in one vehicle parked on the hall property.

Magistrate MacDonald also ordered the accused to enter into a recognizance bond of \$500 as well as ordering him to be of good behavior and keep the peace, refrain from all alcoholic beverages and stay away from the Wellington Centre hall property.

A Moncton man, Joseph Raoul Devin, was fined \$75 and costs for driving while impaired.

A charge of unlawfully escaping Prince County jail, lodged against Norbert Earl Yeo of Summerside, was withdrawn by the crown.

Acting for the crown was George R. McMahon.

## Two Firemen Injured By Fireworks

A fireworks display following the harness racing program at the Charlottetown Driving Park Wednesday night had unexpected results for two Charlottetown firemen.

Hawley Crockett said a two-stage projectile went up only 20 feet and exploded in one stage before it landed on the ground and blew again throwing J. M. Flanagan, weighing about 210 pounds, against the tote board nearby, and caused injury to both of Mr. Crockett's legs. Mr. Flanagan received slight injury to the left leg only.

Fireman Crockett's condition is not serious. Both legs however, are bandaged up but he is able to get around.

The death occurred in Saskatoon, Aug. 17, of Mrs. Edward S. Channell, the former Catherine Stewart Mutch.

Mrs. Channell was a daughter of the late Benjamin Mutch and Amelia Jenkins Mutch of Earncliffe, P.E.I.

## LET'S SEE... IS IT LEFT OR RIGHT?

That's right you go to the left, as anyone looking at the picture can tell by the arrow on the left of the barricade. You might find yourself a little unsure of just which way you were to turn if you came upon this sign east of Southport at 40 mph. You might not realize that the cotton arrow on the left is in any way connected with the detour sign on the far right. This sign is being used to guide tourists and other motorists along a detour off route 1, main road to the south eastern portion of the Island and the main road to the Wood Island ferry. In light of this example of our highway markings you might be surprised to learn that in a survey of tourists leaving the Island, being conducted by H.C. Acres Co. for the provincial government, one of the most frequent complaints touring motorists have is the manner in which our highways are marked, or not marked.
