TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

THE FISHERY TREATY. MAIN POINTS THE HEADLAND QUESTION.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 16. It is learned this evening that the manuscripts of the treaty signed last night by the members of the Fishery Commission were prepared by the confidential Secretary of the Conference a week ago. The meetings of the past few days were confined to a discussion of minute details, but it was at last decided to sign the prepared manuscripts without alteration. The text of the treaty makes about 4,000 words. What the American fishermen may or may not do within three miles of the coast promontories is the burden of the case.
