CAHA Has Accepted Universal Draft Plan

FORT WILLIAM, Ont. (CP)—A special committee of the Canadian Amateur Hockey Association has accepted in principle a "universal draft plan," chairman Fred Page says.

The Western Canada Junior hockey committee approved the plan at a meeting in Winnipeg Dec. 3. The committee was set up last August to study ways of improving junior hockey.

Mr. Page declined to give further details of the plan, but said in an interview Wednesday:

that if it was adopted it would bring some structural changes in junior hockey across Canada. It needs approval by the CAHA before it could go into effect.

Mr. Page said copies of the plan have been sent to all National Hockey League clubs and Canadian Amateur Hockey Association branches for their consideration.

MONTREAL (CP)—Montreal Canadiens returned home from Toronto Thursday with the prospect that right winger Bernie (Boom Boom) Geoffrion and defenceman Tom Johnson may miss two weekend games.

Both players suffered painful wrist injuries in Wednesday night's National Hockey League game, won 2-1 by Toronto. They were sent to hospital here and x-ray examinations revealed no fractures. Johnson's injury is to his left wrist; Geoffrion's to his right.

Hockey Loop Is On Strike

SEPTILES, Que. (CP)—The three teams in the eastern division of the North Shore Hockey League are engaged in what amounts to a strike because Septiles city council won't grant the league a larger cut of the gate.

Septiles' \$350,000 arena, with artificial ice, was opened last winter and was owned by the town's recreation association. When the association got into difficulties the city took over the arena. Septiles is 325 miles northeast of Quebec.

The North Shore League was formed this year, with three teams in each the Eastern and Western Divisions and an interlocking schedule.

Under arrangement with the city for games at the arena, the league received 50 per cent of the gate for the first 400 admissions and 25 per cent for more than 400. The remainder went to the city. Admissions for Sunday games have been around 1,500, at other times about 600.
