GREEN GRAPES at Kennedy's. (May 3rd) HORRIBLE DEATH.—A six year old daughter of Mr. John Ross, of St. Martin, N. B., was playing the other day with some other children in a yard close by her home. A fire had been made to burn some rubbish, and by some means the little one's clothes were ignited, and before assistance could be rendered her clothes were completely consumed and her face, neck and arms burned almost to crisp. The little sufferer died shortly after. ACCIDENT AT BANGOR.—The Moncton Train on Tuesday morning last, Alex. Cameron, a gravel train hand, and a native of Murray Harbor, P. E. I., in attempting to jump on a moving train at Bangor station, lost his life and fell on his face between the platform and the car. Four wheels passed over him, crushing his right arm close to the shoulder, almost severing it from the body. The wounded member had to be amputated. GRAPES at Kennedy's. CURRENT NOTES.

The American public has paid \$229,663 58 to see Mrs. Langtry the past twenty-four weeks. Dickey Bros., of San Francisco, the largest shipbuilders of the Pacific coast, have failed, liabilities \$100,000. Earthquake shocks have been felt in Sicily, undoubtedly due to Mount Etna, which will probably break into open rupture before long. Fred Mann, murdered the Cooke family at Little Rideau, near Ottawa, last winter, has been arraigned at L'Original. The plea of insanity has been raised. The French expedition to Tonquin is creating so much excitement in China that several French ironclads are kept near Shanghai and Hong Kong. Numerous awards have been made to persons who suffered by reason of violation of the law in Ireland. Of the amount of compensation gazetted Lady Mountmorris and Mrs. Blake each receive £3,000 for the murder of their husbands. In an exhibition wrestling match at Spanish Fort between Muldoon and Bauer, in which the former engaged to throw the latter five times in an hour, Muldoon won four falls in 17 minutes when Bauer withdrew. Muldoon was thrown once. The trial, at Rome, of Toquetti and four other persons charged with conspiring to murder Signor Coccapieller, member of the Chamber of Deputies, in August last, resulted in Toquetti being sentenced to four years imprisonment. The other prisoners were acquitted. About 300 Irish immigrants, chiefly families, arrived at Montreal a few days ago, en route to St. Paul, Minn., in charge of a young priest. They came from Connamara, many being ill-clad, the children barefooted, and all apparently in a most destitute condition. The Board of Aldermen of New York have passed a resolution requesting the trustees of the East River bridge to change the day of opening the bridge from the 24th to the 30th inst. The reason given by the author of the resolution was that May 24th was the birthday of the Queen of Great Britain it was a day offensive to the Irish. Reports come from abroad to the effect that the crop of grapes in the champagne producing districts of France was almost a total failure last year. Many manufacturers will not make a single bottle of champagne from their last vintage. But what does that matter to the average wine drinker, as long as the apple crop of this continent is abundant. In the French Senate, on the 1st inst., Duc de Broglie questioned the Government as to its position in regard to the triple alliance. M. Challemeil Lacour, Minister of Foreign Affairs, replied that he was unable to understand the utility of a question upon a matter which was surrounded with the greatest obscurity. France, he said, purposed to remain in accord with all foreign countries as far as was compatible with her dignity. The subject was then dropped. "Who and what is O'Donovan Rossa?" asks a correspondent. Rossa is a native of Cork. He was born in 1832. When he was fifteen years old his father was evicted from his farm. This fired young Rossa's blood and he identified himself soon after with the Phoenix Society, out of which the Fenian organization grew. He was arrested on account of his connection with the first named society in 1858. In 1865 he was again arrested for treasonable practices. He was liberated in 1870, when he came to New York and started an hotel. He had been a shep-herd in Ireland. A MONSTROSITY.—A few days ago a woman named McLeod, belonging to Colchester Co. (whose husband died some three months ago), arrived in this city with her child, to see if she could get it taken into some charitable institution, so that she could make a living for herself. She was driven by the cabman to the Infants' Home, whence, as she said her offspring was three years old, she was sent with it to the Poor House. The child is said to be three years of age. It has the resemblance of humanity, but acts very strangely, whining like a dog, is both deaf and blind and is idiotic; its body is very long, and has the appearance of being that of a child seven or eight years of age; the spine is very supple, and from the formation of the joints of the legs they can be moved by the child in almost any direction. It lays on its stomach most of the time, whining like a dumb animal, and is continually digging at one of its eyes when excited—sometimes by its actions removing it from its sockets. The matter was reported to S. P. C. as a case of cruelty, but investigation has revealed the fact it is merely another freak of nature.—Halifax Record.

Sheridan, and Tynan, all Americans, for the murder of Lord Cavendish and Mr. Burke. Their extradition from the United States, where they now reside, will be demanded. Twenty-two "True Bills" have been found against parties charged with conspiracy to murder, and James Mullet and Wm. Morley have pleaded guilty. Election Case Voided. OTTAWA, May 4. 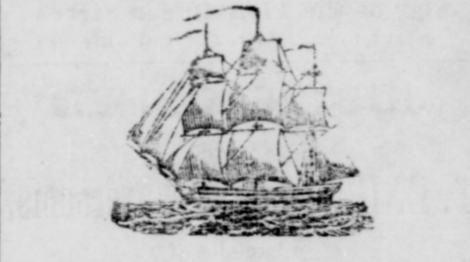
